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Shamrock center says 'Yes' to Michigan

About a minute past midnight, July 1, Chris Young received a telephone call.

But Young wasn't upset.

He was still awake, enjoying his 17th birthday, which fell on the day before. Besides, the call came from University of Michigan men's basketball coach Steve Fisher.

There's nothing rude about that.

That phone call made on the first day coaches could contact recruits went a long way in luring Young, Detroit Catholic Central's 6-foot-10 senior center, to the Ann Arbor campus.

Young has made a verbal commitment to attend U-M. He is the first player to commit to the Wolverines during an off-season sparked by allegations of NCAA violations by the men's basketball program.

Young told Fisher of his intentions at Thursday's We Believe In Steve rally put on by U-M supporters.

"I just got lucky and grabbed him," said Young, one of about 1,000 U-M supporters in attendance. "His eyes got real big and he said 'Oh my God that's great.' He started hugging everybody."

Young, a first-team All-Observer choice as a junior and

also considered Michigan State University, Southern California and Loyola of Chicago.

"It's been my intention to commit before the season started," Young said. "I didn't think it was fair if I had made up my mind last week, to wait and wait and wait. I was kind of sick of the mail, phone calls. I've got a stack of letters today."

"It's been very flattering. I never even dreamed anything like this would happen."

Especially since he didn't start playing organized basketball until the eighth grade at St. Edith School in Livonia.

Young said he was 5-9 in the eighth grade, taller than most of his classmates, but a foot shorter than what he is today. Young played soccer throughout grade school, often with Cino DiGiandomenico, another St. Edith product who decided to take up football when he outgrew soccer. DiGiandomenico grew into a 6-4, 260-pound defensive tackle at UC who signed with Miami of Ohio for football.

Young didn't give up soccer until his freshman year at CC. "I watched the first day of soccer tryouts at CC and the little guys were so fast, I said forget it," Young said.

His coach at St. Edith, Chuck Uhlinger, kept him interested in basketball. Uhlinger now coaches at Churchill High School.

"I didn't like the first month of the season, but then coach Uhlinger showed me an interesting drop step, I started using it and playing well," Young recalls.

Young also credits CC head coach Rick Coratti and assistant John Mulroy as well as former assistant Greg Wendt and trainer David Broz for his development.

Wendt, 6-6, is a former CC and University of Detroit-Mercy standout who played professionally overseas and the 6-10 Broz is a former Ball State standout.

Young has had a busy summer, playing AAU basketball for the Motor City Mavericks, coached by Clarkston coach Dan Fife and Walled Lake Central assistant coach Tom Negoshian.

He also spent a week in Indianapolis, Ind. at the Nike All-American camp for the nation's top 100 basketball players. He experienced his first bit of jet lag when he had to play a summer basketball game for CC a couple hours after a flight home from the AAU national tournament in Orlando, Fla.

Young said Dane Fife, the Clarkston senior and the leading candidate to win Mr. Basketball, is everything people say he is.

"He's one of the best I've played against and I love his dad," Young said.

The recruitment of one Young is over, but for another it could be just starting. Young's sister, Jennifer Young, is a 6-1 junior to be for Livonia Ladywood's volleyball team.

Chris doesn't envy all the letters his sister might get from colleges, but he's kind of jealous of her sport.

"You can play and be on the beach all day, too," he said.

Rams survive 'monster homer'

The first-place Michigan Rams wrapped regular season Friday at Ford Field by splitting a double-header with Downriver Adray.

The Rams, who finished 16-11 in the Livonia Collegiate Division of the Adray Metro Baseball Association, lost the opener, 7-3, before bouncing back to win the nightcap, 6-5.

The Rams, headed Aug. 2 to the All-American Amateur Baseball Association Regional in Altoona, Pa., salvaged a split with a three-run seventh against Downriver Adray in the nightcap.

Consecutive singles by Joe Seestadt, Tom Seestadt and Todd Miller, followed by a balk and two walks by Downriver reliever Dave Susalla, who prepped at Redford Catholic Central and plays for the University of Detroit-Mercy.

Brian Cotner (Eastern Michigan) worked the first 6½ innings before giving way to Susalla.

Rams reliever Rickey Miller, who went the final 1½ innings in place of starter Jason Hoorn, earned the victory.

Hoorn survived a monstrous two-run homer off the top bank of the light tower by Jason Copeland, who finished with two hits. John Miele also had two hits for Downriver.

Former Plymouth Salem High ace Mike Marsella, who throwing for Saginaw Valley State, pitched the first five innings in place of the opener.

Susalla earned the save.

Tom Willner, who pitched the first four innings for the Rams, took the loss. Terry Bigham (Henry Ford CC/EMU) finished up.

Former Wayne Memorial standout Shannon Green, Jason Gombos, Scott Barrett and Miele each collected two hits for the winners.

Greg Rogers (EMU) went 3-

for-4 with a double and a run to lead the Rams.

Other top offensive performers for the Rams included Schuyler Doakes, 2-for-4 with a run scored and a stolen base; Ricky Miller, RBI; Brian Isitt, two hits and two RBIs; Tom Biljan and Joe Seestadt, two hits apiece.

Down 7-3 with the bases loaded, two-out and a 3-2 count with the runners all moving in the seventh, the Rams had a potential rally squelched when Isitt was ruled out when he couldn't avoid a line shot trying to advance from second to third

base.

In an exhibition game Monday, the Rams rallied for three runs in the sixth inning to defeat Class A Birmingham Lynch, 7-5.

Eric Pierce had the game-winning 2-run single.

The Rams used six different pitchers with Tom Willner gaining the win and Brian Berryman earning the save.

Auge Garrett belted a 2-run homer off Rams starter Bob Mason in the first inning. Dean Rovinelli added a solo homer off Rams pick-up player Dave Rossow (Livonia Adray) in the second.

In the third, Jay McLenaghan doubled, reached third on a passed ball and scored on Jay

Alexander's sacrifice fly to make it 4-0 Lynch.

In the fourth, McLenaghan singled, stole second and scored on Garrett's RBI, but the Rams rallied for four runs in the bottom half of the inning to tie.

Isitt, Doakes, Rickey Miller each had two hits for the winners along with Livonia Adray pitcher Jay Uzaraki (who knocked in two runs).

The Rams played Hines Park in an exhibition game yesterday.

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
