Church adopts lay Christian service program

When Lana Leckie of Bingham Farms learned that Northbrook Presbyterian Church was enrylling in the worldwide Stephen Ministry program, she immediately volunteered to become a lay leader.

"We had talked about Stephen Ministry for many years," asid Leckie, a nine-year member of the Beverly Hills church. "But nobody had taken the ball to go with it."

Things quickly started rolling at the church at 14 Mile and Lahser roads once Leckie and former associate minister, the Rev. James McCracken, returned from a week of intensive study at the Stephen Ministry training conference in Orlando, Fla.

"We came back with a very ambitious plan," recalled the former dental hygienist. "We started our training classes three weeks after we got back."

During the three years that the Stephen Ministry series has been in place at the Oakland County church, 31 individuals—ranging in age from 30 to 76—have undergone the 50-hour training session at confidential, one-to-one relationship with a church member experiencing a challenging situation like hospitalization, terminal illness, aging, divorce, job loss, or the loss of a loved one.

"The primary objective of Stephen Ministry is to open the line of communication with the care receiver and to encourage the care receiver to discuss

what is going on emotionally and spiritually," explained Leckie, who directs the pro-gram for the 850-member con-

Leckie, who directs the program for the 850-member congregation.

"We cannot solve anyone's problem. What we can do is be there as a friend and as someone who listens to them. We stress that the power of the Holy Spirit sent by God will work through you. We as Stephen Ministers are to be caregivers. God is the curegiver.

Pam Moffett of Birmingham sees Stophen Ministery as a way to give something back to her church community. "I feel like we've all probably ministered to people in our life in one way or another," said the retired nurse. "Phis is a more formal way to care for someone in a Christian atmosphere."

A member of Northbrook for nine years, Moffett chose to familiarize herself with the program by attending the Stephen Lender conference in Orlando.

"I was with 600 other people and everybody was there for the same purpose—to minister to others," she recalled. "Being in the midst of such monderful people adds more excitement and more zeal to the ministry."

Once she returned to Oak.

land County, Moffett began teaching Stephen Ministry classes, coordinating referrals and sorving as a care giver. The good part about Stephen Ministry is that it's so confidential and anonymous, "she said. Care givers and care receivers are paired in male-to-male and female-to-female relationships. Depending upon the situation, meetings between care givers and care receivers can occur in a variety of settings — from homes and restaurants to parks and movie theaters. The key is to offer support, prayer and an unbiased our to the individual in need.

"I've gained a real good
understanding of people and
the needs they have, and I've
developed and improved my
communication skills," said
Moffett, who admits that some
sessions were characterized by
tears and hugs. "What's impacted me the most is that I realize
how blessed I've been."

Edith Fles of Bloomfield
Township was among the first
16 individuals to attend training sessions at Northbrook.
She began her first relationship as a Stephen Minister with
a care receiver struggling with
terminal illness.

But the phone calls, notes,
words of encouragement and
twice monthly visits ended ten
months later when the care
receiver lost her battle for life.
Though she feels the loss, Fles
says ahe feels privileged to
have shared the experience.

"Hopefully I have become a
more caring person," said Fles,
who has a degree in community

Oakland Jews make journey to their 'second home' in Israel

They rode Jeeps up the rocky slopes of the Golan Heights, went rubing down the Jordan River, hiked the Judean Hills and floated in the salty, mineral-rich waters of the Dead Sea.

But for several Ondand County singles on the United Jewish Appeal's largest mission trip to Bracel, Jerusalem seemed to hold the most powerful moments. I was in this holy city that the entire 13-bus constituency gath:

cred for worship on a small section of the monumental steps, that centuries ago, led to the second Temple in Jerusalem.

"We met at the Western Wall twelcome in Shabbat," said Marc Berke, campaign associate for the Jewish Federatian of Metropolitan Detroit. "We had our own eremony with 540 people."

The following evening, the young adults marked the end of the Sabbath with a special Bar/Bat Mitzvah ceremony. Among the 200 participants was Southfield resident Lies Barson, where the Temple once

The summer mission trip, sponsored and subsidized by the United Jewish Appeal and the Jewish Federation, was open to single Jews ages 25 to 40 throughout the country. The Bloomfield Hills-based Federation drew a constituency of 28 young adults, nearly all from Oakland County.

For 27-year-old Berke, the July 6 to 17 excursion represented his third visit to Israel, his first stab at staffing a mission and another opportunity to visit his great uncle and his family.

"Going to Israel is special every time," and the Royal Oak resident, who divides his time at Federation between handling campaing gifts and working with young adults, "Israel, the special connection with Israel. It's like going to your second home."

Israel was home to Bartan during her junior year of college abroad seven years ago. Once she sattled with the group in Tel
