I have found it very easy to set the plants in a bucket or a brown paper bag so that the heads can gracefully fall over the edges. The plants will dry with a curved look and work especially well in wreaths.

You may dry some both ways, then have a choice as you make the arrange-

Other flowers from your garden can also be dried this way. Monardas, silver king, flower stems of lamb's ears, globe thistle, grasses, tansy and lavender. Try all you can find and experiment. When the flowers have faded from our gardens, you can still enjoy their beauty for some
