must only pay \$210 million—only for the years between 1991-20 and 1993-94 — and is not responsible for accrued interest. Farmington schools stood to receive slightly more than \$20 million, Maxfield said; instead the district will get about 40 percent of that amount.

"Now the question is, will it be paid immediately, or paid over time," Maxfield said. "And really, it's in the hands of the Legislature to figure that out."

Even though the amount to be returned is much lower than expected, Maxfield said. "There's an important legal victory that's been won. Not only did the state err in the past, but they have an obligation in the future to meet the standard that was seatablished" at the time of the Headlee Amendment in 1978. According to Maxfield, the uncertainty surrounding amount and timetable of reimbursement poses a question mark about the Sopt. 16 bond issue.

Whatever the district receives could be used to pay for some of the facilities needs included in the \$391. million two-part package. In that case, the Farmington school board could simply decide not to sell the maximum amount of authorized bonds.

"But we have no idea what that amount (from the state) will be or when it will come," he said.

that has to be subsidized in some fashion."

Council has spurned setting up a DDA in the past, but some members indicated they at least be willing to listen. Council members asked City Attorney John Donohue to look into the pros and cons of DDAs and TIFs and report his findings in mid-September before setting up a study session. study session.

Such a study session wouldn't take place until October.

TIFs do not raise taxes, but allow municipalities to earmark

revenue growth for designated areas.

areas.
The city of Farmington has a DDA and collects tax revenue growth from a designated principal shopping district. Proposal Aseverely limited the amount of tax mency DDAs could collect, mainly revenue from the public schools. As a result, Farmington's DDA established a principal shopping district.

One Hills council member was puzzled as to why the developer is exploring the idea of such a district.

"If the only thing they're talking about is (collecting revenue) from the growth on this project, I can't see why they're spending a lot of time of this," said Nancy Bates, council woman. "That can't be a lot of money..."
