strectorner artists who are achieving mainstram success. Madeline Peyroux learned her craft from the street musicians of Paris' Latin Quarter. When she was 16, she started as a har passer for a group of busking musicians called The Riverboat Shufflers, eventually convincing them to let her sing.

The results were so impressive that the leader of a competing busking troupe. The Lost Wandering Blues & Jazz Band, gave her an imprompt audition. He liked what he heard, and Madeline speat the next three years touring Europe in a cramped Mercedes.


