

Doubles teams crucial to North success

North Farmington must produce competitive doubles team if the Raiders are to be contenders again for the Western Lakes Activities Association title.

That's the veteran coach Norm Stanislawski's assessment of his team as North prepares for its season opener Tuesday at Bloomfield Hills Andover.

The Raiders are well situated at singles with seniors Heather Richeson, Sarah Hand and Rachel Wool in the top three spots.

But all of their regular doubles players have either moved up to singles play or graduated.

"We need to get consistent points out of our doubles team," Stanislawski said. "If we're going to be productive, we have to get some help from those people."

Richeson was 16-3 and the WLA runner-up at No. 2 singles, and she replaced Lauren Jones in the No. 1 position this year.

"She will face keen competition from Livonia Stevenson's Whit-

ney Crosby, the defending WLA champion, and Farmington Harrison's Carla Shade, according to Stanislawski.

Hand also was 16-3 last season while playing at No. 3 singles and winning the WLA title.

She will probably play No. 2 singles but could move up if she beats Richeson in head-to-head competition.

Wool, who combined with junior Liz Schnarr to finish second in the WLA doubles tournament at third doubles, takes over for Hand at No. 3 singles.

She was 12-5 in doubles action last year and was the league champion at No. 4 singles as a freshman.

The new No. 4 singles player and the No. 1 doubles team will come from a group of players that includes seniors Jodi Siakind and Rachel Scheinfeld, junior Sarah Kay and Schnarr. All played doubles last year.

Seniors Traci Swarin and Robyn Steinlauf will play another of the doubles positions.

Other doubles prospects are senior Theresa Pigula, juniors Natalie Myre, Jana Ciesman and Lori Schehr, sophomores Marie-

as Sloan, Julie Maltzman, Laura Bean, Annette Gajda and freshmen Joyce Chung, Julie Shindler, Rachel Holkin, Amanda Pilner and Rachel Grossman.

The Raiders, who were 13-2 in dual meets, finished second in the conference behind Northville and placed fifth in the regional, hope to be WLA contenders again.

"If we can improve in doubles, we can offer some still competition," Stanislawski said, "because our first three singles players will be consistent winners. But that's still only three victories."

Farmington High School

With most of their team returning, the Falcons hope to improve upon a 2-8 record in duals and an eighth-place finish in the WLA.

Junior Fawn O'Leary, who was 8-6 playing No. 3 singles last year, moves up to the No. 1 position.

"Fawn worked hard in the off-season and earned the position," coach Dennis King said, adding O'Leary will probably be ranked in southeastern Michigan.

"No. 1 singles in our conference is not an easy position to play. You can have a losing record and still be a good player. She'll be able to give everyone a good match."

Junior Carrie May returns at No. 2 singles where she had a 7-7 record. With another year of experience, she also has shown improvement, King said.

Senior Stephanie Unger, who played No. 1 singles, is recovering from an injury to her left wrist she suffered at pom-pom camp. She returns to third singles where she played as a sophomore.

"We'll see how her injury healed," King said. "At this point, the wrist is a little tender, and I don't want to push it right now."

"It's not a big switch (between O'Leary and Unger). All three are pretty close (including May). I think Fawn is a little better than the other two right now, but all three are good players."

Senior Carly Ramsey returns

at No. 4 singles, and the top two doubles teams are back intact.

Seniors Susan Kettler and Joanne Gore will play No. 1 doubles again, seniors Karl Berkeach and Karen Pawloski No. 2.

Sophomores Annie Gourley and Molly Weaver will be another of the doubles teams. Freshman Lynday Howard will help the Falcons somewhere, according to King.

"Our team strength is the fact we have virtually our whole team back and we have a lot of experience," King said. "We're expecting to do better than last year, and we were competitive with most teams in the conference; that's why all the ties."

"We'll see if we can't close the gap on the stronger teams (Northville, North Farmington and Livonia Stevenson)."

"I'm hoping, with the experience we have at all positions, the girls will come through and play some strong matches against those teams."

Farmington starts the season Tuesday at home against Bloomfield Hills Lahser.
