Patrons don't need to whisper a password, know a special knock for the door or present a laminated membership card. Copper Creok Restaurant and Golf Course in Farmington Hills is not a private club.

"One of the difficulties we have here is that we are perceived as a private club," as ald John Rugani, Cooper Creek restaurant general manager.

"Yes, you will also see sports conts, suitsand-ties, and evening dresses because people
are always celebrating a special occasion,
but in general, people today are looking for a
fine dinner in a nice atmosphere without all
the fuss," Rugani said.

Summer brings another invitation to Rugani's full-menu, lunch or dinner on the patio overlooking the ninth green.

The menu lists slow-roasted prime rib on Friday and Saturday nights and several choices for steak, seafood, chicken and veal

every night. House favorites include Twin Filets Del Mar, two four-ounce filets topped with shrimp and crab draped with Bearmaise Sauce, Planked Atlantic Salmon, and Broiled Whitefish. Dessert offerings include homemade chocolate mousse, cheesecakes and carrot cake.

While the bottom line for any restaurant is the food, and Copper Creek delivers the goods, there are three more incentives to sample Copper Creek atmosphere.

### Oak Park man charged in Hills armed robbery

An Oak Park man charged with holding up a Farmington Hills office worker at gunpoint during her lunch hour is a sus-pect in similar armed robberies in the area, Farmington Hills police said.

Cassalle Leray Nettles, 26, was arraigned on one count of armed robbery before 47th District Court Judge Fred Harris Thursday. A not-guilty plen was entered in his behalf. He's being held in Oakland County Jail in lieu of \$15,000 corporate surety bond. A preliminary exam is set for 1:30 p.m. Wednesday, Sept. 3, before Judge Harris. Conviction could bring a felony sentence of up to 15 years in prison.

Oak Park police said they arrested Nettles for fleeing and cluding after they tried to stop he vehicle he was in for allegedly changing lanes without signaling. Farmington Hills police had the man under surveillance after a detective linked him to the lunch-hour robbery through a vehicle description and a partial plate number, said Farmington Hills commander Chuck Nebus. The detective (Matt Kochn) took a partial plate and vehicle description from two different robberies and he played with the computer until he received a combination of numbers that matched the vehicle," said Nebus.

Nettles was charged in Farmington Hills after the lunch-hour hold-up victim identified him. In that incident on Aug. 4, an office worker was robbed while-eating lunch inside her car in a parking lot on Northwestern Highway and Middlebelt Road. The robber pointed a silver semiautomatic pistol at her head through the rolled-down car window and demanded her purse. After getting the woman's purse, which guerman walked away, Nebus said.

## West Bloomfield, Hills plan meeting to discuss roadways

With nearly \$200 million in development being planned for the intersection of Orchard Lake, Northwestern Highway and 14 Mile, officials of West Bloomfield and Farmington Hills said they

Northwestern Highway and 14 Mile, officials of West Bloomfield and Farmington Hills said they meed to talk.

"Because we share the same boundaries, it's a real good idea to communicate with one another," said West Bloomfield Supervisor Jeddy Hood.

"This is a good opportunity for that," said Farmington Hills City Manager Dan Hobbs.

The meeting is planned for 5:30 p.m. Monday, Oct. 6 in West Bloomfield Town Hall. Although discussion will not be limited to the Orchard Lake-14 Mile development proposals, they will stand high on the agenda.

A 53-acre parcel on the northwest corner of Orchard Lake and 14 Mile in West Bloomfield is set to be developed into houses and businesses. And the area between Orchard Lake and Northwestern Highway in Farmington Hills will be the site of a major redevelopment including a Super Kmart store.

Both projects are expected to cause a large increase in traffic at the intersection shared by the two communities.

Hood said the meeting will be informal but will give the township board and city council a chance to share their 'philosophies on development. "We see this as an opportunity to see that what will happen will be first class," Hobbs said. 'This is not a meeting to decide the development but talk about how the two jurisdictions will work. This is a substantive issue. We need to be committed to doing it right."

West Bloomfield and Farmington Hills in the past have been at odds over road development Hills officials had a public hearing to discuss roads.

"The majority of people who participated were from Farmington Hills," West Bloomfield, but

resisted a proposal to widen 14 Mile, which borders both communities but is under the jurisdiction of Farmington Hills.

That has been somewhat of a sore point among West Bloomfield officials.

In time we will widen Maple, Holland said. But that won't alleviate all the traffic problems because a traffic jam on Maple will spill over onto 14 Mile, he said.

Holland also was not too keen on proposals to widen just the intersections along 14 Mile.

"Big deal," he said. "They widened Maple at Farmington and it makes it easy to turn right but as soon as you get past the intersection you get back to two lancs."

However, Farmington Hills Mayor Aldo Vagnozzi was not too receptive about widening 14 Mile.

Mile.

"If any road is to be widened, it would be 15 Mile (Maple)," Vagnozzi said. Much of 14 Mile is bordered by residential areas, he said.

At the upcoming meeting, however, Vagnozzi said the focus will be on traffic problems at Orthard Lake and 14 Mile.

"We're looking to see if anything can be done to alleviate the traffic problems," Vagnozzi said.

Both communities view the intersection as a "gateway."

"I also would like to see a joint effort to approach the Legislature to do something about our roads,"

the Legislature to do something about our roads," Vagnozzi said.

Beyond that, Vagnozzi said he hopes the two communities will continue to hold joint meetings, possibly on an annual basis.

"Hopfully this is the beginning of more unity," Vagnozzi said.

West Bloomfield trustee Deborah Macon said she thought the joint meeting was a good idea.

"It's an opportunity for us to look at how we will relate to one another," Macon said.
"Intergovernmental cooperation is very high on my priority list," Macon said.
"Working with the League of Women Vaters.

"Intergovernments copy and priority list," Macon said.
Working with the League of Women Voters,
Macon has had much experience dealing with area
communities, she said.
"For me this is a natural," she said.
