Once the sun came out they moved away and we started fishing the docks. We caught some nice largemouth flippin' and pitchin' under the docks. We used everything: crankbaits.

Randles and Daniels have teamed up two other times this year and they did extremely well both times. They placed second and third in a couple team tournaments on Saginaw Bay which were sponsored by the U.S. Fishing Ascociation.
