Stanford, Johnson lead Warriors to convincing win over Falcons

There's a target on the filming tower overlooking the practice field at Walled Lake Western. It was placed there by the coaching staff as a reminder to the Warriors that, as defending Class AA state champions, they will be targeted by every team they face.

It's a reminder that every game must be played as if it was the last game of the season and that no opposing team can be taken lightly.

Farmington had its sights set on the Warriors Friday, but it was Western's high-powered Wing-To offense that hit the bullsays as the host Warriors dialed in on a 60-12 victory.

Led by sonior quarterback Frank Stanford (12 carries for 143 yards and one TD) and junior fullback Dave Johnson (12 carries for 100 yards and four TDs), the Warriors churned up 428 yards of turf. Stanford also completed five of nine passes for 89 yards and one touchdown.

"They made the big plays," Farmington coach Lauri Niekanen said. They're a good football toam. Stanford is everything they said he was. He's a great player; we couldn't get a bead on him. When we did line him up, he wasn't there when we got there."

Stanford proved to be an elu-sive target all night, but it was Johnson who put the Warriors on the scoreboard with a 50-yard touchdown run on their first play from scrimmage.
Following a 28-yard Farming-ton punt, Western took over at midfield early in the first quar-ter. Johnson broke a couple tack-les at the line of scrimmage, then shook two more would-be-tæcklers at the 15 before ram-bling into the end zone. Adam

Junior Dean Adams wranged up the scoring with a 59-yard TD run with 4:08 left in the game.

"We have to attain our dream of back-to-back state championships," Stanford said. "We want to come our ready to play, whoever we play. We're pretty pleased with our performance. The line played real well tonight. We're getting better every week.
