A majority of community
policing programs do not cost the
department money.

For instance, the Bicycle
Patrol Program only costs in
terms of equipment whereas the
School Linison Program is partially funded through Farmington Public Schools.

"It's just added responsibility
to the d-partment and its personnel," Dwyer said. "In fact,
there hasn't been an increase in
our budget as it relates to community policing."


