From the ashes, Farmington rebuilt. A new building housing both the Masonic Temple and City Hall was constructed—a building that still graces Farmington's downtown.

The rubble was replaced witnewer businesses and the north side of Grand River today makes up a vital part of the central business district.

Another fire in 1909 burned its way north from Grand River long Farmington Road and stopped just short of the Baptist Church. Remove plaque often; collar curbs barking; keep cat litter clean; ferrets need shots

How necessary is it to clean my cats teeth and how often?

Daily removal of plaque is the key to preventing and controlling dental disease. There is documented evidence that daily teeth cleaning reduces tarter build-up by 95 percent, or by 76 percent for weekly cleanings.

The do-it-yourself method is very easy. It consists of goalty rubbing your cats teeth and gums with a piece of gauze soaked in diluted solution of hydrogen peroxide, or use baking soda in water. Also you can use a feline toothpaste. It can cause excessive salivation and if swallowed may result in gastro-intestinal upsets. My cats like the human baby finger toothbrush. It has soft bristles and slides on my finger. It's small enough so that it fits nicely just under the cats lips to clean their teeth.

My dog barks during the day while I'm at work. I have to leave her outside while I'm gone. The neighbors are complaining about her barking. What can I do to control her barking. What can I do to control her barking. What is barking. To stop nuisance barking, you can use one of two kinds of collars. The first collar (which I don't like) is the electric shock collar, available at pet stores. A better alternative is the Citronella collar.

The Animal Behavior Clinic at Cornell University School of Veterinary Medicine shows that a spritz of fragrance under the chin is more effective than electric shock.

Citronella collars, which administers a squirt of fragrance when the dog barks, are available at pet supply stores and through catalogues.

My brother and I cach have a pet Chinchilla. Can you give us some tips on cleaning their cages?

Chinchilla tend to choose one spot in the cage to climinate, allowing an alert owner to place a small pan of non clumping cat litter in corner, making cleaning easier. The best bedding choices include include corn cob litter or white pine shavings. Please avoid codar shavings, it can cause respiratory problems for Chinchillas.

Wet litter should be removed daily. The cage should be completely cleaned every four to six days. Because Chinchilla constantly shed their fine silky hair, clumps of hair can collect in corners and crevices of the cage. Remove these clumps several times each week with a damp cloth.

Do ferrets need any vaccinations? How

Do ferrets need any vaccinations? How often should I trim my ferrets nails?

All ferrets must receive a check-up and vaccinations against canine distemper within 24 to 48 hours of buying your little friend. Ferrets nails need to be trimmed about every two weeks to py-vent them from getting caught in bedding. Cat clippers are best to use to trim a ferrets nails.
