OU plans big new technical institute

The Oakland University Board The Oakland University Board of Trustees recently approved plans for a 60,000 square-foot School of Business and Applied Technology Institute and appointed the architectural firm Albert Kahn Associates Inc. to begin work on the schematic design.

The \$17.5 million project, to be funded with a 75-25 percent cost sharing of state and university funds, is to include classrooms, computer labs, faculty rind administrative offices, video conferencing, multimedia computer labs and a production facility and multimedia nuditorium.
