Companies are encouraged to exhaust all options – including the search for another site in the community – before moving. "It (exit permit approval) does send a message whether or not a community is pro business," Kaczmarck added.

Plymouth Township offers a 50-percent tax break for a maximum of five years, a township official said. That deen't include the 6 mills levied by the state, though.

Plymouth Township Supervisor Kathleen Keen-McCarthy refused to speak specifically about Hella. She's not aware if

the company has made a formal application, but said the name sounded familiar.

"Any company can apply that wants to move here, but if they don't have a release from their current city, we can't offer them an abatement," Keen-McCarthy said. "They have to have the release."

Tax abatements are not the only reason companies relocate, Kaczmarck said.

"In the end, though, companies move all the time for a variety of reasons: Not just tax reasons," Kaczmarck said. "In many cases, the tax abatement is not the driving factor but a piece of puzzle when trying to calculate the bottom line."
