Rock's field goal lifts CC over Rice

Brother Rice was literally caught between a Rock and a hard place in Sunday's annual Boys Bowl clash. That's Rock, as

Rock bosted a dramatic 41-yard field goal as time expired to lift Catholic Central to a 14-12 triumph over rival Brother Rice.
A standing-room only crowd of more than 7,000 watched as, for the third straight year, the outcome was decided on the game's final play.

"This was awesome. The wind

goal of the season kept the stateranked Shamrocks a perfect 5-0.

"I just knew it would come

CC coach Tom Mach was elated with Rock's poise under such

pressure.

"He just did a tremendous job of overcoming so much adversity in this game," he said. "He had missed an extra point and a field goal (in the first half). For a young man in high school to come back and kick the ball like that with so many people watching, that was a great sign of mental toughness on his part.

"We told (Rock) at halftime that he was going to win the game for us. We know this game is always close and tough, and we wanted to keep his spirits up. If we were going to give out a game ball like they do at ABC, we'd give it to him."

CC opened the scoring late in the first quarter on a 30-yard touchdown pass from Adam Tubaro to Don Blankster. Rock missed the extra point.

The Warriors went 20 yards on their none possession drive ended with a fin ely-executed 32-yard touchdown pass from Pat Creddock to Mark Goebel. Kevin Gerback missed the extra point, and the teams were tied at halftime.

CC tallied five points in less than a minute midway through the third quarter. Rock kicked a 31-yard field goal to cap CC's first drive of the second half. Two plays later, CC noseguard John Abshire tackled Rice's Justin Turk in the end zone for a safety and an 11-6 lead.

It stayed that way until, with 1:07 remaining in the game, Craddock his Ron Jackson in the right corner of the end zone with a 31-yard scoring pass. Rice went for two points, but Craddock was tackled shy of the goal.

CC began its game-winning drive from its own 18-yard line.

Tubaro completed three passes that sent the Shamrocks to the Warriors 36. CC lost three yards when Tubaro was sacked. On the next play, the Warriors were called for pass interference that put the ball on the Rice 24 with five seconds left. Rock provided the heroics.

"It's great to win those kinds of games and it's tough to lose them," said Brother Rice coach Al Fraensen, whose team fell to 3-2 overall and will be hardpressed to make the playoffs. We almost pulled through and beat them. That little bump there on an uncatchable ball was the turning point."

CC had 274 total yards, Rice 254. The Shamrocks rushed for 158 yards, and Rice had the better passing total with 234 yards. CC workhorse Chris bueweke finished with 87 yards on 22 carries, and Thorne completed 13 of 25 passes. Craddock, who completed passes to seven receivers, finished 20-0f-35, Jackson had five catches for 62 yards, Karl Pawlewicz and Mike Scott caught four passes each.
