\$220,400 from the park's millage and \$661,200 in a matching grant from the state's Natural Resource Land Trust Fund.

The vacant land prompted a tug-of-war between active and passive parks enthusiasts. The first group sought additional soccer and baseball facilities while others wanted a natural refuge. That was settled when the old sod farm became available for what is now Founders Sports Park.

A front portion of Woodland Hills was set aside for a proposed new Farmington Hills Public Library building, which voters turned down in a 1992 bond election. Now the library is looking to expand at its current spot on 12 Mile Road.

To get the word out, Special Services Director Dan Potter, Naturalist Joe Derek and councilwoman Cheryl Oliverio have produced a video for cable TV while lawn signs have been printed.



The "Say Yes to Woodland Hills" is an informational campaign that, despite preconceived notions, is apparently needed, Stewart said.

"I had a dinner party the other night and some of the guests saw my sign and didn't know what it was about," Stewart said. "I don't think many people in our

community — some of whom are transient and come here for jobs and then move on — are not that aware of it."

"It will be inevitable that some kind of development will take place," said West Bloomfield trustee Marc Shulman. But he added that attention must be given to how the "quality of life" will be impacted by the development.

"We should proceed slowly," Shulman said. That was the general view of all the officials who took turns giving their perspective on the development.

"This is the beginning of a process," said Farmington Hills Mayor Aldo Vagnozzi.

"This is a wonderful opportunity," said Farmington Hills City Manager Daniel Hobbs. "We have a once-in-a-life opportunity to make something out of this. I'm very optimistic."

"This is an opportunity for us to talk together, to see how we envision the community," Hood said.

While both communities are cooperating, each has specific

concerns and different methods of operations. Farmington Hills is a city, which controls its own roads. West Bloomfield is a township and almost all of its roads are under the jurisdiction of the Road Commission for Oakland County.

Development, such as the widening of 14 Mile, must involve the road commission.

Farmington Hills has in place a process called a Plan Unit Development, which allows the city essentially to bargain with developers. To win approval for a project, the city can negotiate to have the developer pay for new infrastructure such as roads and sewers.

West Bloomfield has no such process, however, township attorney Gerald Fisher said such a system could be adopted.

Beyond that, the two communities should coordinate building designs to bring some cohesiveness to the appearance on both

sides of the border, Hood said.

But the conversation never strayed from the issue of traffic.

Farmington Hills resident Sam Rolick questioned how many people the new developments would bring into the area, including residents and employees.

Lorna McEwen of West Bloomfield suggested a moratorium be placed on development. "We'd like to see more open space. The entrance to the township should be nice and green," McEwen said.

"We are all concerned about traffic and the quality of life," said Farmington Hills councilwoman Nancy Bates. "But people have a right to use their land. We don't want to end up in litigation."

The two communities need to continue to work together, Bates said. "We don't want people to use us against each other."
