Books, bargains

Borders opens discount store in downtown

The new Borders Outlet in down-A town Farmington is no full-service Borders. For starters, there's no cap-puccino bar, just a coffee pot stationed at the side of the cash register.

But its the books and bargains that are making a good first impression on customers who have stopped by since the store opened in late September

Jennie Prey of Farmington clutched two hardcover Walt Disney books (regularly priced at about \$12 each) and a Larry McMurtry fiction title – all priced at \$2.98 – and still walked around browsing for other possible purchases.

"The pricing's great and the selection is pretty good," Prey said Monday morning. "But there isn't a lot of fiction."

Prey said there "is a need" for such a bookstore in downtown Farmington. "I feel bad for the used bookstore across the street (Books Abound), but everything there is too condensed, too crowd-ed. It's easier to find books here."

According to Bozena Golec, a
Farmington Hills resident, Borders
Outlet made a favorable impression simply because of the volume
and variety of books. She was flipping through the pages of Faberge:
Russian Master Goldsmith, a \$60
book priced at about \$25.

"This is great," Golec said.
"There are a lot of books, nice books. I'm just browsing through to see what they've got. There are a lot of different subjects and there are good prices, too."

Checking out reference books near the back of the store was Farmington Hills resident Richard luck. He said the name recognition of Borders should help build business, as will the downtown location.

"Given Borders' reputation and large customer base, I suspect a lot of people are going to seek this place out," Iwick said. "It's a nice

Since opening Sept. 27, in a storefront between Pier 1 Imports and HFC Household Finance, business has been steadily improving, soid manager Jeff Baumann. But he admitted some fine tuning is continuing to be done. For example, there were two sections of sports books, but no sign on the wall above them.

Baumann said Farmington is a good place for such a bookstore, because "People in this area tend to be college educated, they're avid book readers."

Despite that, he has had to deal with customers expecting to walk into "a full-line Borders," the megastores that feature sofas, coffee bars and an extensive selection of magazines and newspapers, Baumann said.

What they do see are tables filled with older, but never-sold books such as "Lincoln," by David Herbert Donald; "Beatles at the Movies," by Roy Carr; "Charles Kuralt's America"; and "The Language of Life," by Bill Moyers, for \$4.98 or \$5.98. Or a display case of discounted, but not used compact discs including Jeff Beck's "Wired" for \$4.99 or Elvis Costello's "Brutal Youth" for \$5.99.

Baumann emblasized that

Baumann emphasized that items on sale at Borders Outlet are shipped from the chain's ware-house, and are not shuttled over from nearby Borders Booksellers, such as the one at Orchard Lake-13 1/2-Mile in Farmington Hills.

Although the variety among the 30,000 titles impresses the customers, employee Jennifer Kales sees a void on the shelf, especially
