Guarding history: West Bloomfield's Holocaust Memorial Center takes visitors through the horrors of the Holo-caust, but the lesson that comes with this experience, ultimately, affects viewpoints for the better, says Rabbi Charles H. Rosenzveig.

The reason I don't believe it has been overexposed is because, in the final analysis, the Holocust was a consequence of thousands of years of human projudice... So therefore, it may take thousands of years to eradicate it.

What is the Holocaust's most important lesson?
To maintain a society's restraints against the evil impulses of the people. . . Checks and balance are critical.

Dese time distance us from the Holocaust?
It would appear to be the reverse. The younger people are more apen-minded in learning about it. It's particularly true, by the way, in Europe.
