

One of Matt Gregory's earliest memorias of sailing was the time he was forced ashore by an irresistible force. But he wasn't shipwrecked and Mother Nature wasn't to blame. Opposing him was his father, Charles, who determined his 7-year-old son was too young to join his crew on the annual Port Huron-to-Mackinac laland race.

"I remember crying at the dock, because I couldn't go with him," said Matt, who knew then he wanted to sail boots.

Gregory's tears apparently were convicting. He started racing with his dad
