

POLICE AND FIRE CALLS

The following were police and fire items that occurred during the past week in Farmington and Farmington Hills.

CRACK COCAINE
In Farmington Hills:
Police arrested a Detroit woman, 34, after finding one rock of crack cocaine in a plastic bag in the pants pocket of a passenger in a 1986 Chevrolet Monte Carlo on Grand River and Eight Mile Nov. 20. Police stopped the vehicle for having a loud exhaust. The woman denied

knowing the drug was in the pants pocket and said the slacks didn't belong to her.

BREAKINGS
In Farmington Hills:
A stereo and CD player were stolen from the dash after the lock was punched on a 1997 Chevy Suburban parked at Windemere Apartments between Nov. 20-21, causing more than \$100 damage.
A cellular phone and brief case were stolen after the driver's door window was smashed on a 1987 Audi 5000S parked on

Orchard Lake Nov. 21, causing more than \$100 damage.

THEFT
In Farmington Hills:
Five boxes containing a network mainframe worth \$3,620 fell out of a 1990 GMC on I-696 Nov. 19 and were picked up by a man in a black Ford Bronco.
A \$550 snow blower was stolen from a garage on Elizabeth Way between Nov. 15-16.
A woman's purse containing credit cards and \$5 cash was stolen from the restroom at Leo's Coney Island on 12 Mile Nov. 21.

EMBEZZLEMENT
In Farmington:
An assistant manager at I.G.A. Supermarket, 24065 Orchard Lake Road, intends to prosecute two stockboys for attempting to steal a six-pack of Budweiser, valued at \$4.45.
According to public safety reports, the manager spotted a 16-year-old employee walking from the beer cooler toward the back room "trying to conceal" a six-pack of beer.
The manager followed him into the stock room and saw another stockboy, 17, suspiciously standing in an employee lounge that didn't have the lights on.
The 16-year-old told police he took the beer out of the cooler because it was "too full." The second stock clerk claimed he didn't know anything about the incident.

CONCEALED WEAPONS
In Farmington Hills:
Police arrested a Bowling Green, Ohio, man, 30, for carrying a concealed weapon and driving while his license was suspended after finding two handguns and magazine rounds in the 1989 Lincoln Continental he was driving on Orchard Lake near 13 Mile Nov. 20. A LEIN check revealed the driver had five driver's license suspensions.
Police arrested a Southfield male, 17, after finding a marijuana pipe and, later, a knife on a teen walking with eight others on Byron and Ontaga Nov. 20. Group members were wearing similar black and white Starter jackets and were walking in line, blocking the road. Officers could smell marijuana and searched individuals, finding the marijuana pipe on one teen. During a search at the station, a knife also fell out of the teen's pants.

DRUNKEN DRIVING
In Farmington Hills:
Police arrested a West Bloomfield man, 37, for drunken driving on northbound Orchard Lake near 14 Mile around 3 a.m. Nov. 22. Police stopped the 1993 Plymouth Acclaim for driving erratically. The driver said he had six to seven beers at a bowling alley, including last call. He had a blood alcohol level of .10 percent. It's illegal to drive in Michigan with a blood alcohol level of .10 or higher.
Police arrested a Farmington Hills man, 32, for drunken driving on Orchard Lake and Ravine at 2:05 a.m. Nov. 23. Police

stopped the 1997 Dodge after it was traveling 63 miles an hour on southbound Orchard Lake. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .10 percent.

ASSAULT
In Farmington Hills:
A 29-year-old man told police he was struck with an unknown object - later determined to be a beer bottle - on the left side of the head by another man at the Cadillac Cafe Nov. 23.
Police were called to Denny's Restaurant on Sinclair after one cook grabbed another in a headlock and threw him to floor around 1:20 a.m. Nov. 23. The one cook was told to leave and was gone when officers arrived. The other cook had a small cut on the bridge of his nose.

The victim said she was walking down the hallway when a man of Asian descent smiled and then grabbed her arms and started kissing her. She hit him in the neck and fled to her apartment and locked the door.
