The message was clear. Drunk driving causes death and destruction, and the Oakland County Chapter of MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Drivers) can make a difference.

MADD launched its 12th Annual "Tie One on for Safety-Red Ribbon Campaign" Tuesday at the Oakland County Commissioners' Auditorium by urging motorists to join the campaign to end drunk driving.

"Drunk driving is a violent crime," said television personality Huel Perkins, this year's honorary campaign chair. It's a violent crime that kills and maims thousands of people and causes \$45 billion in damages annually,

he said.

But it's also a violent crime that can be prevented, or reduced, by raising public awareness, Perkins said. By displaying the MADD red ribbon, he continued, "we can make people realize that getting behind the wheel after drinking is not only wrong, but it's selfish and stupid."

MADD and the public awareness it's generated have made a difference, Perkins said. The number of alcohol related accidents has gone down by roughly 24 percent over the last nine years, he said, thanks in great part to MADD.

Oakland County Prosecutor David Gorcyca, one of dozens of county officials attending the

kickoff, said MADD's influence has been "profound. Every year, people see the red ribbons, and every year more people get the message," Gorcyca told reporters.

Several speakers had already felt the devastation of drunk drivers. Among them was Richard St. Cyr. His son, Jeremy was a week away from graduating from Troy Athens High School last May when he was killed by a drunk driver near Chicago.

"The driver had two previous DUIs (driving under the influence of alcohol)," said St. Cyr. "But at his sentencing, he claimed the accident was his 'wake up call'.

He had his wake-up call, and he ignored it," said St. Cyr. Although Illinois laws are more relaxed than Michigan's, according to St. Cyr, the drunk driver who killed his son was sentenced to nine years in prison — news that was greeted with applause.

St. Cyr said MADD and its supporters must continue to pressure the courts and law enforcement agencies for high penalties. "The fear of getting caught" must be strong enough to act as a deterrent.

To curb drunk driving, said St. Cyr, motorists must have a fear of getting caught and the knowledge that once caught, the penalty will be sure and severe.

Fear of getting caught should be enough to keep people from drinking and driving in the first place, St. Cyr said.

It's therapeutic for the family to speak out against drunk drivers, said Debbie St. Cyr, the mother of Jeremy. The grief of losing a loved one will never

completely go away, she said, but she and her family can more readily cope with grief knowing they are helping to alert people about drunk driving.

People who want to help MADD can support the organization by buying tickets as part of the annual fund raiser, said Rita

Kaplan, a West Bloomfield resident whose child was killed by a drunk driver.
