"He wants the best school in the nation and we're pretty close," said Craig Auten, Central's restructuring co-chain and cacher liaison to the PTSA. "We've got every component, but the last one is the hardest to work with."

Instead of students accepting what they're told, Auten said, Hartsock envisions them performing the work.

"Kids become the teachers, they become the artists, they become the poets," Auten said.
"It's one thing to learn about a math concept, it's another to show it through a project."
"He feels that we are so close, as a school, to a major breakthrough and won't take that step." Auten said. "If we don't. he feels he might not be the right match for us as a group.

A prime example is an independent study group of three Central seniors who are design on architectural plan to build a playground, gazebo and other landscaping for the new Foster Farmhouse site in

Walled Lake.


