It was dedicated to four Troy teenagers killed earlier this year in two separate crashes involving frees who had been drinking, Killed were deremey St. Cyr. killed in a Mny 24 crash in the Chicago area, and Ashley Easterbrook, Michael D. Jamieson and Andrew R. Stindt who were killed June 3 in Troy.

"The spoken word will keep some people from drinking and driving," said Homeaster, who lives in the general neighborhood as the families of St. Cyr. Jamieson and Stindt. "But a song will be more effective." The Troy High School Orchestra will accompany Homeister and her daughter, who sing together in the Troy Baptist Church choir. Another choir member, Mark Ilamlin, helped with the arrangement.

"I can't read or sing from sheet music," said Homeister, who said she felt compelled to write the song because of the grief caused by the untimely deaths of the tecongres.



250 people attend annual vigil

Normally Dec. 11 was a happy occasion for Troy resident John Stindt. His son Andrew was born on that day, and on Thursday Andrew would have turned 20.

But this time John Stindt was hurting. His son and two other Troy tecangers—Ashley Easterbrook and Michael Jamicson—

were killed in a car crash on

June 3.

The 1996 Pontise Grand Am in which they were riding was struck broadside at Long Luke and Crooks by a car police said ran a stop light. The driver—who police said had been drinking—was also killed.

Instead of celebrating Andrew's birthday, John Stindt spent much of the day remembering his son . . . and trying to get over the hurt inside.

Later that night, he was one of about 250 people to attend the annual Candlelight Vigil sponsored by the Oakland Gounty Chapter of Mothers Against Druk Driving (MADD).

"I was very emotional," said Robert Willett, state coordinator of MADD. "If the people who drink and drive could go through this, it might make a difference." Willett's son Kenneth and his two cousins — Kelley and Dale Sas — were killed as they were riding in Pontiac on Oct. 2018.
