margarine, lemon juice, Dijon mustard and ground red pepper. For salads, instead of oily dressing, use a balsamic vinegar and spice mix. Instead of spreading butter on breads or rolls, use a reasted

spreading butter on breads or rolls, use a ronsted garlic spread.

Instead of cream cheese dips for vegetables or creakers, strain yogurt over cheesecloth overnight. Yogurt will have the consistency of cream cheese; or use fat free sour cream. When making cheese-cake, instead of cream cheese, mix low fat ricotta cheese and low fat cottage cheese or yogurt. If using fat-free cream cheese for baking, you must use block, not tub, cream cheese.

Baste the turkey with low sodium chicken broth instead of butter. Instead of pan drippings for gravy for the turkey.


