The senior trio of quarterback Jared Hopkins, fullback Zack Cornwell and tailback Chris Ghannam shared the Most Outstanding Back Award at the team's Dec. 14 banquet. 
"Last year I said we were a team of overachievers," Herrington said. "We weren't overachievers this year. We were simply the best football team in the state of Michigan.
