nlready on the road when a call comes in are several factors con-tributing to the achievement, said Public Safety Director Gary

Goss.

But Goss, who Monday night
made a presentation and showed
a video of the report to the
farmington City Council, lauded
his department for the achievement. There are 22 full-time officers (including seven who are
fully licensed emergency medical
technicians) and another 20 in
reserve.

House fire appears to have been accident

An estimated \$100,000 dam-

An estimated \$100,000 damage was done to a house by a fire Sunday night.
Firefighters were called to the house on the 6000 block of Inkster, south of Maple in West Bloomfield. Four people – two sdults and two childron – were in the house, but had been nawkened by a smoke detector. They escaped unharmed.
It is believed the fire started in a utility room near the center of the house, said Pat Riney, fire investigator. The fire is still under investigation and appears to be accidental, he said.

The majority of the credit has to go to those guys on the street, "Goss said following the meeting. They have a multitude of tasks to perform and they do them all well. One word to define them all is caring ... I'm proud of the job they do."
Soveral city council members were pleased with Farmington's top ranking.
There's no way you can put a price on that until you are there and need your help," said Mayor Mary Bush to Goss shortly after his presentation. 'It is one of the fine examples of why Farmington is the best place in the state to live."

Council member Arnold Campbell called it "a tremendous achievement" that Farmington finished first.

With its average of just over two minutes, the public safety department finished well shead of the competition.

The second-best response reported by Channel 50 was Inkster, at 3:48. The response by Livonia firefighters was four to five minutes, while both Troy and Westland took five to six minutes.

Although the televised survey did not refer to the city of Farm-ington Hills, Lt. Michael Garr estimated that the average response time for that larger city is 4 1/2 minutes. He said that mark is an improvement ever previous years, because of the addition of Station No. 5 on Orchard Lake near 11 Mile

Also in the report, it was esti-mated that firefighters typically should take no more than six minutes to arrive at the scene of

a blaze.

"If you can get there within six minutes you can normally maintain and extinguish a fire," Goss

The first Farmington officer to make it to a scene, while not equipped with ladders or fire hoses, can immediately call in for additional help. And there is equipment (including Automatic External Defibrillators) ready

External Defibrillators) ready for use in partol car trunks.
"We have a system in place," Goss said, "where the dispatcher recoives a call (from the first-responding officer) when there as a situation of smoke or any indi-cation of a fire. She immediately begins calling back people from home."

The city has up to four platoons and three engines to combat blazes, depending on size, of course, Goss said. The Farming-

ton Hills Fire Department is available as backup for major

fires if needed.
"The first officer on the scene "The area officer on the scene surveys the situation and coordinates the units in," he continued. "If there's a rescue, if there's someone inside, he has turn-out gear and can get inside the building and begin rescue

Farmington Hills' Garr, how-ever, noted that comparing fire service in different-sized cities such as Farmington and Farmington Hills is like comparing apples and oranges.
He said responding Farming-

ton Hills Fire Department units have equipment and resources to immediately begin dousing flames and saving people when they get there. In smaller cities with public safety departments, the first officers at a scene often must then radio in for additional help, such as fire engines.

"In a small territory," Garr said, "the (patrol) officers are their firefighters, they're on the road. But it's not the fire truck."


