Spiritual connection: Imam Syed Salman of Troy discusses the importance of Ramadan, the ninth month of the Muslim calendar characterized by dawn to dusk

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Other community rituals at the mosque at 1830 W. Square Lake Road include weekend itar parties. Iftar is the daily breaking of the fast, which is done precisely at sunset by the one billion Muslims around the globe. Each Friday during the holy month, Salman invites guest Imams from surrounding communities to give the sermon before the afternoon prayers at the Oakland County mosque.

'It gives people a different perspective and joins the community together. That's what we believe, that all are equal in the sight of God,' he said. 'And we stand for prayers facing north-coast toward Meeca. There's a feeling of unification because everyone is facing one point in the whole universe.'

Though he works full time as an engineer for Chrysler Corp., Salman manages to free time to serve at Unity Center, which draws a constituency of 50 families of Américan, Arabic, Indian, Iraqi, Iranian, Pakistan and Syrianl heritage. As the religious leader, he is responsible for the prayer and the ritual sapecta at the mosque, for guiding the constituency open and for ensuring a spiritually uplifting the constituency open and for ensuring a spiritually uplifting

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A native of India, Salman came to the United States to continue his studies at the University of Detroit and began saving as an Imam in the city in 1971.

"The concern and care I feel for the community and for humanity brought me into this," said Salman, who resides in Troy with his wife, Mona, and their four daughters. "In Islam, there needs to be a balance between the world and the spiritual aspects of life."

Ramadan culminates with the sighting of the next new moon on January 30. After Morning Prayer, Muslims spend the day visiting family and friends and exchanging gifts in a post-Ramadan festival known as "Eid."

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The term, Islam, means peace, purity, acceptance and commitment. The most important measage of the faith, said Salman, "is peace and good will to all people."

"Coming to the United State has been a great experience for me and the biggest blessing is the openness and freedom we have here," added Salman, who visits Mecca every year. "The opportunity for intellectual growth, social growth and apiritual growth, social growth and apiritual growth is unlimited. Hopefully the revival for the world will come from here.

# Local high school students study in Israel for 4 months

Five local high school students participated in an exchange program in Israel from Sept. 3 to Dec. 29.

ec. 29. The five students (two from Congregation Shir Tikvah in Troy and three from Temple Beth El in Bloomfield Township) were among 30 students from around

the United States selected to participate in the Eisendrath International Exchange Program through the National Federation of Temple Youth. This program included a four-month intensive course of study with high school-level classes at Hebrew Union College in Jerusalem.

During their stay at Hebrew Union College, the students lived on campus but they also had the chance to spend four weeks living with host families throughout Israel.
