

He established the Sprague Electric Railroad and Motor Company. By 1892 on Jefferson Avenue in Detroit, street cars ran on electric power.

Soon this system of transportation spread to other locales and a network of streeter lines emerged. They provided transportation to people and goods that did not have access to a regular railroad line.

The Detroit Northwestern Railroad completed their powerhouse in Farmington in 1900. Soon, the company merged with other troily lines and formed the Detroit United Railroad (DUR) in 1901.
