Going ice fishing? Here's scoop on area lakes

Orchard Lake is excellent for pike on tip-ups right in front of the state boat launch on Orchard Lake Road and behind Apple Island. Large suckers or dead bait suspended three feet above the weeds or one foot off the bottom work well. Pan fish can be found on the flats and along the many weed lines and readily accept wax worms or spikes. Crappic, ranging from eight to 13 inches, are plentiful in the

weedy areas of the lake and are caught on small shiner minnows throughout the night and just before dawn.

Sunny warm weather will weaken existing ice so be aware of those balmy aftermoons.

On a final note, always let someone know exactly where you'll be fishing and never go out alone.
