are very useful and should help the viewer to improve on certain facets of the game.

There are many other excellent videos around that are worth watching. Most are aimed at the intermediate bowlers who need to improve their basic skills in order to get more out of bowling.

Most video rental outlets in this area carry a few good bowling videos. It is well worth the time to look and learn.

## House Training That New Puppy

The first step in house training a puppy is to purchase a crate. Although your puppy may initially object to be confined, this area will become a safe and secure refuge and keep him out of trouble when he can not be monitored. At first he may soil this area but within a short time he will develop control so as not to mess up his "den".

The most important aspect of training is consistency. Choose an appropriate spot for elimination and have all family members use the same command such as "go outside". In this way your puppy will learn to go to the door when the command is repeated and the scent at this spot will stimulate elimination.

Establish a schedule so their puppy knows what to expect and take notes to see developing patterns. Take him out first thing in the morning, 30 minutes after each meal, and again just before bedtime.

Your puppy must understand the reason for being taken outside. Using another command at the

soiling spot such as "go potty" will signal elimination. After your puppy eliminates, praise him and bring him back into the house so as to separate play time from elimination time. After a few minutes in the house the puppy can be brought outside to play.
