## AIR BAGS STOLEN

**In Farmington Hills:** An air bag was stolen from a 1997 Chevy Cavalier parked at Woodhull Apartments on 12 Mile between Jan. 28-29.

Three vehicles had tires punctured while parked on Sky Drive Jan. 28, causing \$300 damage.


## DRUNKEN DRIVING

## Expert on English Reformation to speak at Tyndale

William Tyndale College of Farmington Hills will sponsor its 17th Annual Staley Distinguished Scholar Lecture series Feb. 3-5 featuring Dr. David Daniell, international scholar and expert on the English Reformation.

All lectures will be held in the William Tyndale College Kresge Chapel, 7:30-8:30 p.m. and are open to the public free of charge. No reservation necessary.

Lecture topics include William

Tyndale as a Protestant Reformer and Martyr, Tyndale's Role in the Development of the English Language, and The Crucial Part Tyndale Played in the Creation and Publication of the Bible in English.

Daniell is professor emeritus of English at the University of London, is founder and chairman of the Tyndale Society, Oxford, England, and one of the world's foremost authorities on William Tyndale, a 16th Century

martyr who first translated the Bible into English.

Daniell studied English and theology at Oxford University and completed postgraduate work at the University of Tübingen, Germany.

He taught 25 years at the University of London, directing Shakespeare studies. Most recently, he was a visiting professor at King's College, London and a visiting fellow of Magdalen College, Oxford University.

He was curator of the British Library's "Let There Be Light" William Tyndale exhibition which, after London, traveled to the Huntington Library in California, the New York Public Library, and the Library of Congress.

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
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
