

POLICE AND FIRE CALLS

The following are police and fire incidents that occurred in Farmington and Farmington Hills during the past week.

BREAK-INS

In Farmington Hills:
A carton of cigarettes was stolen after both passenger windows were broken out of a Mercury Mystique parked on Hollyhead between Jan. 29-30, causing \$500 damage.

A baby transport, play pen and sunglasses were stolen after the top was cut on a 1993 Toyota Celica parked on Thames Jan. 30, causing \$2,000 damage.

An AM/FM factory stereo was shattered on a 1997 Chrysler Town & Country parked at Botsford Hospital on Grand River Jan. 31, causing \$300 damage.

A 1998 Chrysler Town & Country was also broken into and an in-dash stereo stolen at Botsford Hospital Jan. 31.

A \$1,200 spray paint pump was stolen after the passenger side door lock was punched on a 1995 Ford Econoline van parked at Timberidge Apartments between Jan. 30-31, causing more than \$100 damage.

DRUNKEN DRIVING

In Farmington Hills:
Police arrested a Farmington Hills man, 30, for drunken driving on Orchard Lake and 10 Mile Jan. 30. Police stopped the 1990 BMW after receiving information from Southfield police about a vehicle matching that description speeding and driving erratically on I-696. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .16 percent. The legal limit in Michigan is .10 percent.

Police arrested a Fairhaven man, 45, for drunken driving after the 1988 Ford Ranger he was operating struck a police sedan from behind on westbound I-696 between Farmington and Drake roads Jan. 31. The driver admitted drinking and told an officer he thought he was in Mount Clemens near 21 Mile Road. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .16 percent.

Police arrested a Livonia male, 18, for drunken driving on Eight Mile and Orchard Lake at 1:50 a.m. Jan. 31. Police stopped the 1981 Olds Cutlass after it was driving erratically. The driver had a blood alcohol content of .13 percent.

Police arrested an Ypsilanti man, 31, for drunken driving on Eight Mile and Grand River at 3:40 a.m. Jan. 31. Police stopped the 1986 Ford F-150 after it was on the wrong side of the road on the island. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .16 percent.

In Farmington:
Police stopped a speeding motorist on westbound Grand River at Brittain Hill about 12:35 a.m. Sunday and arrested him for driving under the influence of alcohol. The driver, a 32-year-old Sterling Heights man, appeared intoxicated, with bloodshot, glassy eyes and strong alcohol odor emitting from inside the car. He subsequently struggled with field sobriety tests and blew .16 on a preliminary breath test.

At about 2:30 a.m. Sunday, police chased a motorist driving 62 in a 45-mph zone, on eastbound Grand River just west of Smithfield. The driver then turned north onto Drake Road before officers were able to pull him to the side of the road. The driver, a 32-year-old Farmington Hills man, was belligerent with officers, repeatedly asking why he was stopped. The driver was unable to complete field sobriety tests, but refused to take a preliminary breath test. He was arrested for driving under the influence of alcohol.

ASSAULT

In Farmington Hills:
A Wixom man, 26, told police he was struck by a blunt instrument - possibly a crowbar - after a dispute at the Cadillac Cafe spilled over to a traffic altercation on Grand River near Haynes at 2 a.m. Jan. 31. The victim said he and friends were at the nightclub when one of them got into an argument with eight other men. A doorman ushered the eight out into the parking lot. The victim and friends noticed a vehicle with the eight men following their Ford Explorer. The victim got out of the Explorer to talk with one of the men when he was hit on the right side of the face, busting his lip and knocking out a tooth. The assailant also broke out one of the Explorer's windows.

Police ticketed a Novi man, 45, for assault after a 17-year-old male said he was choked by an

older man at Drakeville Lane at 10 p.m. Jan. 31. The teen said he was with two others at the snack bar when one of the girls started to shine a laser around the area. The man saw the laser on the back of his wife's head and became enraged, saying the girl could put someone's eyes out with the instrument. The victim told the man to go back to his bowling when the elder lunged and grabbed the teen by the throat. The older man denied choking the teen but said he grabbed him by the shirt.

In Farmington:
An employee of the Shell gas station at 37375 Grand River told police he was assaulted by a 19-year-old Farmington Hills man, at about 1:25 a.m. Saturday. The employee, also a 19-year-old from Farmington Hills, said the assailant threw a cup of water at him, jumped over a counter and punched him in the back of the head. He said he did not fight back. But the latter was refused by a witness to the incident, who said the employee swore at the other man and also threw some punches. Apparently, the exchange stemmed from a previous disagreement.

GUN VIOLATION

In Farmington Hills:
A St. Clair Shores man, 33, was ticketed for possessing a firearm while intoxicated at the Holiday Inn on 10 Mile Jan. 31. Police were called to the hotel after an employee overheard a guest saying his gun was missing. Officers talked to the man in the hallway, who said his gun was missing and he was "tossed." The gun - a .45 caliber Smith & Wesson - was later found in the man's coat. He has a concealed weapons permit. A report of the incident will be sent to the Macomb County gun board.

DEER DESTROYED

In Farmington Hills:
An officer shot a deer after the badly-injured animal was struck by a vehicle and had no chance of recovery on 12 Mile and Schroeder Jan. 30.

THEFT

In Farmington Hills:
A handbag containing checks, credit cards and an ATM card was stolen from Office Max on Grand River Jan. 29.

Four wheel covers worth \$900 were stolen from a Cadillac parked at D&P Chiropractic on Grand River Jan. 27.

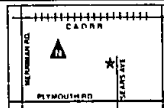
