

Stage set for Falcons-Hawks contest

A strong performance in the Friday contest of each half Friday carried Farmington Harrison to a 76-58 victory over host Livonia Franklin in boys basketball.

Harrison junior Lemar Wilson led all scorers with 19 points. Senior Matt Dorchester contributed 17, and senior Jared Hopkins finished with 12.

The Hawks, who have won four consecutive games and five of their last six, raised their record to 11-2 overall and 5-2 in the Western Lakes Activities Association.

Livonia Franklin is winless in seven WLAAs games and 4-9 on the season.

Eddie Wallace paced the Patriots with 18 points. Nick Monaghan added 15 and Brian Facione hit 11.

Both teams scored 17 points in the first quarter, but Harrison piled up a 20-9 margin in the second period in a bid to turn the game into a runaway. The Hawks cashed in on turnovers in the quarter.

The Patriots chipped three points off the deficit in the third

quarter but were outscored 27-17 in the final eight minutes.

Franklin threatened to get the margin back to single digits a couple times in the last period but was turned back on each occasion.

Harrison helped itself at the free throw line, making 26 of 31 attempts, while Franklin made 18 of 28.

The Hawks protected their margin in the fourth quarter by making free throws while the Patriots were splitting a pair or missing.

Harrison puts its winning streak on the line Tuesday when it plays at Farmington High, which has won its last three games.

Farmington 63, STEVENSON 38: Senior center Trevor Gaines scored 13 of his game-high 21 points in the first half Friday as the host Falcons started fast and cruised to the WLAAs Lakes Division victory.

Farmington, which has won three straight games and four of its last six, improved to 9-4 overall and 4-3 in the

WLAAs. Junior Scott Kreller and sophomore Justin Milus added nine points apiece for the Falcons, senior Matt Orr and freshman Matt Mikel six each.

The host Falcons threw down a pair of dunks and also reached double figures in rebounds.

Sophomore Mike Landon and junior Paul Bowers scored eight points apiece and junior Brett Koch six for Stevenson, 0-12 and 0-7.

The Falcons raced to a 17-7 lead at the end of one quarter and extended it to 34-14 at halftime and 48-22 after three periods.

Farmington made 19 of 29 free throws, Stevenson five of eight.

REDFORD CC 64, DELASALLE 54: Senior center Chris Young scored 20 points and grabbed 15 rebounds Friday to lead the Shamrocks to a Catholic League Central Division road victory at Warren DeLaSalle.

Junior Mike Moore scored 15 points and senior John Jones 14. Sophomore Rob Sparks added seven points.

The 6-foot-10 Young also blocked seven shots. Moore dished out 10 assists. Jones had nine rebounds and five assists.
