

POLICE AND FIRE CALLS

The following are police and fire incidents that occurred in Farmington and Farmington Hills during the past week.

BUSINESS BURGLARY

In Farmington Hills: A cash drawer and \$12 cash was stolen after a board was used to smash a front door window at Happiness is Flowers on Middlebelt and 10 Mile the night of Feb. 19-20.

CREDIT CARD THEFT

In Farmington Hills: Police arrested a Byron, Mich., man, 47, after a credit card was stolen from a vehicle at Page Landscape on Orchard Lake Feb. 21. A person saw a man go into the vehicle and remove the card. He then went to a nearby gas station and used the card to pay for \$25 in gas. Police stopped the man's Dodge Ram on Orchard Lake, south of 10 Mile, where they found the credit card in his sock.

VEHICLE THEFT

THEFT

DRUNKEN DRIVING

In Farmington Hills: Police arrested a Madison Heights man, 27, for drunken driving and having open intoxicants in the vehicle on Orchard Lake and Park Hill roads at 10:50 p.m. Feb. 20. Police stopped the 1982 Chevy pickup for not having its headlights on. Police also found an open bottle of Budweiser in the truck. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .14 percent.

Police arrested a Redford woman, 27, for drunken driving on Eight Mile and Metroview at 11:55 p.m. Feb. 20. Police

stopped the 1995 blue Chevy for traveling 70 miles an hour in a 45-mile zone and hitting the curb while turning. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .16 percent.

Police arrested a Farmington Hills man, 23, for drunken driving on Orchard Lake and 11 Mile at 1:35 a.m. Feb. 21. Officers stopped the 1995 Jeep for weaving on the road. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .19 percent.

In Farmington: A 38-year-old Livonia man was arrested for drunken driving at Grand River-Brittany Hill, about 12:40 a.m. Sunday. The man was spotted driving on the wrong side of Grand River after missing an entrance to Independence Green. He was stopped on near-by Lamb Court. Officers noted a strong smell of alcohol coming from inside the vehicle and that the driver had bloodshot and glassy eyes. The driver had a blood alcohol level of .19 percent.

ASSAULT WITH VEHICLE

Pry marks were found near the front door in a possible burglary attempt at an Averhill residence between Feb. 21-22.

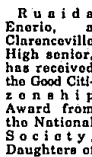
MARIJUANA POSSESSION
