Marnon recorded his fifth shutout of the year, stopping 25 Rice shots on goal.

The Shamrocks had to kill a couple Rice power plays in the

final period, including one with less than three minutes remaining. After the Shamrocks killed the final penalty, the Warriors pulled Jones for an extra attacker.

The game ended with Marnon making a stop on a shot from the point by Rice defenseman Dan Penney. The buzzer sounded before Rice could shoot the rebound back at the net.

Although Brown is giving up his head coaching duties, he still plans on coming around to lend a hand.

"I'll try to make it to a practice a week, open the door during games," he said.

Fennala, who had a career-high 22 in the first game, eight. Fennala also had a pair of treys.

"Farmington came in focused and ready to play," North coach Brian Swinehart said, adding the Falcons outplayed the Raiders and deserved to win.

They played hard and got the ball to Trevor, and Trevor was able to produce for them. What hurt us was getting down early. We had to extend our pressure, and that took away from our game plan."

After Orr made a three to give Farmington a 6-2 lead, the Falcons were ahead all the way, racing to a 16-5 lead at the end of the first quarter.

The Raiders missed their first 12 three-point attempts but caught fire in the second quarter, making four of their last five shots (three of them three). But Farmington still led by 10 at halftime, 26-16.

"The difference was we weren't strong enough defensively to make a run at them," Swinehart said. "Every time we made a big shot they were able to counter it."

Gaines and Milus combined for 14 of Farmington's 20 third-quarter points as the Falcons shot 9-of-14 in the period and

extended their lead to 46-31 at the end.

Farmington did a better job of getting the ball inside to Gaines and Milus against North's zone. Gaines was strong as usual around the basket, and Milus dropped in a lot of open jumpers near the hoop.

"A lot of times we put Trevor on the wing, so they couldn't double down on him — and that left Justin open one-on-one," Mikel said. "When we move Trevor, that opens the middle for Justin. That was a big key for us offensively."

North still trailed by 10 or more points through much of the fourth quarter and didn't get under 10 until Szirtes made his last three with 41 seconds remaining for a 55-47 score.

The Falcons made eight of 11 free throws in the fourth quarter and offset North's three-point shooting edge by making 19 of 28 overall. At the line, the Raiders were 9-of-13.

"The kids felt bad last Friday after the loss," Mikel said. "There was a lot riding on that game. We had a chance to be division co-champs and to have North come to our gym."

"We lost all those advantages, so the kids made up their minds

they weren't going to lose twice to the same team."

"We had a great practice Thursday and a team dinner at my house last night. Then we watched the video of last week's game and talked about the things that happened. The kids came focused tonight; they wanted this one real bad."

The victory marked the first time Farmington has beaten North in the four years Swinehart has coached the Raiders, according to Mikel.

"I'm honestly happy for Donny," Swinehart said. "I coached with him for four years at Farmington, and he taught me a lot of basketball."

"I'm happy he and his kids are having such a great year and are able to advance in the tournament. I wish them the best and hope they come away with a shot to win the conference championship."

The Falcons will have to overcome a Salem team that beat Farmington in January, 76-41.

"I think we're going to play them a lot better than we did the first time," Mikel said. "I told the team anything can happen. We need to have two good days of practice and get ready for whoever we play."

# CC wrestlers lose to Kimball in team regional

Detroit Catholic Central lost to Royal Oak Kimball in a Division I wrestling regional semifinal Wednesday at South Lyon, 36-30. The Shamrocks recorded only one victory before Kimball figured it had the match won and voided the final four weights.

Kimball lost to Northville in the championship match.

"The score was not indicative of the match," CC coach Mike Rodriguez said. "They killed us. They had it won by the time we got to 171."

Sophomore Mitch Hancock

was the only Shamrock that got a chance to wrestle to win. He pinned his opponent in 1:20.

Rodriguez said the loss won't detract from the opportunities four Shamrocks have in the individual state tournament. Hancock, John Abshire (189), Bruce Naysmith (215) and Casey Rogowski (275) competed in the regional Saturday.

"We'll give it another shot," he said. "We have a good nucleus coming back. All the guys going to the regional are juniors except for Hancock. We should have four state placers, and that's a pretty good nucleus."

Rogowski is the favorite to win the state title, he added.

"Casey wasn't born a heavyweight," he said. "He grew into a heavyweight. His mobility is much better. And he's as big and strong as they are."
