Freshman MaryJano Valade (Mercy) was named to the All-Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association first team, and junior Kelly LaCosse (Harrison) made the second team for the second year in a row.

She won MVP honors at DePauw and was named to the all-tournament team at Anderson. LaCosse led the team in assists (80/3.2), steads (60) and free-throw percentage (.750). She scored in double figures 21 times.

The Hornets finished the season 5-7 in the MIAA and 5-17 overall.
