Gadjev competed in a state final last November as a member of Farmington Harrison's Class A championship football team.

the 215-pound class. "My goal is
to be all-state (finish in the top
eight), and my second goal is to
be first at state."

"I just have to go out and wrestle whoever I have to wrestle, and what happens will happen," Gadjev said. "My philosophy is your mental attitude needs to be that you can go in and win."

But a wrestler can't be overconfident as Gadjev said he was in his first regional match against a Carleton Airport sophomore.

He lost but won his next three to qualify, defeating Marshall's Tim Williams on points in the consolation final.

"I wasn't prepared for the
(first) match," Gadjev said. "I
was just out to qualify for state
after that. I had to do it; I just
had to come back. I wouldn't let

"All I know is this season he lost to a guy I defeated last year at districts," Lema said.

"It's a lot of mental preparation now more than physical. You practice your moves, what works for you, but overall you have to clear your mind. You have to clear your mind. You have to concentrate and take it one period at time.

"If you lose the first match, you have to look at the second match and know you're still in the tournament."

Loma won his first regional match but lost his second when a knee injury recurred. He rebounded to win his last two, pinning (3:18) Mason's Jon Van Dommelen in the consolation final.

"I got down a little bit (after the loss), but coach (Barry) Walsh, my brother (Tony) and the rest of my teammates were there to help me get my head straight and focus for my third match, which was a do-or-die match, Lema said.

Farmington coach Al Beyar believes Lema has what it takes to do well in the state meet.

"Jerry has a style of wrestling that could surprise a lot of people," he said. "He has a good head-lock, and he uses his hips real well. He's very deceiving with it. He can throw anybody on his back."

"Wun never counted out of a match," Lema said. "Coach aga! I could be down 14-0 and still come back.

"You never know what to expect. One minute I might be trying for a throw, and the next I'll be shooting at your legs."
