Spearheaded by Rep. Hubert Price, D-Pontine, ATP was developed by the college, Greater Pontine Consortium, the bus agency SMART, Pontiac Urban League and two state departuments — Family Independence and the Jobs Commission.

Gast, who chairs the appropriations subcommittee on community colleges as well as the full committee, said he parted company with Gov. John Engler's proposal to keep the 28 community colleges at a total of \$271 million with no increase from the current year.

"We're going to ask for 1.6 percent more (\$4.1 million)," Gast said, Half will go into an acrossthe-board increase for all colleges, half for formula increases.
In addition, Gast said, he will ty to pry 2 percent more (\$6.4 million) from the current fiscal year's surplus for a "supplemental" appropriation bill. The funds would be carmarked for technology, infrastructure and muintenance.

technology, infrastructure and maintenance. Currently, OCC gets a bit more than \$20 million of its \$100 million-plus budget from the state.

"This is no guarantee," said Gast. "How much will prevail, I don't know. I think it's attainable. The money is there, but there's going to be a big scramble to get it.

"We're gonna get static from the front office (Engler). And whatever we do, the House will maneuver to change it."


