## Starbucks gets outdoor OK

Farmington coffee lovers will get to sip their favorite boverage in the open air.

On Monday, the city council approved a request by Starbucks to allow outdoor scating at the coffee chain's Downtown Farmington Center store. An architectural consultant ropresenting Starbucks, Marie Haener-Patti, told council members that the store is expected to open at the end of next week barring unforeseen circumstances.

With the approval, eight tables will be located outside Starbucks, enough to accommodate 20 customers. Five of the tables will line the north side of the building, along Grand River,

while the other three will front
the store. The tables and chairs
might be stacked and brought
inside during off hours.

Haener-Patti added that the
tables would not be covered by
umbrellas. The outdoor seating
is permitted between April and
October, according to council's
approval.

"People, especially when the
weather is pleasant, like to take
a cup-of coffee and a pastry outside," said Haener-Patti outside
the council room. "We've been
trying this (outdoor seating) at
as many locations as possible."
Farmington is considered to be
an attractive apot for the national
chain, she noted.

"They (Starbucks) like to be in
these urban areas," Haener-Patti

said, because they can get a fair amount of pedestrian traffic. This is an area that has vibrant street traffic. So this is a good location for us."

The store is at 33119 Grand River, in the space formerly occupied by Farmington Florist and an adjacent business. Reno-vation is nearly complete.

Haener-Patti added that another Starbucks will open next week in downtown Royal Oak

another Starbucks will open next week in downtown Royal Oak and that another store is being radied for Grosse Points.

Before the first cup of house blend can be poured, Starbucks will need to receive the seal of approval from the state health department. Haener-Patti told the council that an inspection is scheduled this week.

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
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
