Volunteers process tax forms for local seniors

Anyone who has completed a 1997 tax return, especially if capital gains are involved, knows that you don't have to be a senior citizen to find the process perplexing.

But seniors, 60 years and older, in Farmington Hills have a wonderful resource at tax time and beat of all, it's free.

The American Association of Retired Persons (AARP) sponsors a volunteer run tax service that costs nothing but a couple of hours of time. Tuesdays at the Farmington Hills senior center and Fridays at the downtown Farmington branch library, through April 14, seniors can bring their tax statements, pertinent financial documents and a copy of last year's return and leave the stress of crunching numbers to someone else.

"We've done 491 returns in 16 sessions to date," said Bob Wightman, who coordinates the volunteer operation. "We'll hit 700 before we're done." In the Wexford Room of the activities center Tuesday morning, a dozen volunteers sat at tables strewn with pencils and tax forms across from their lients.


