Holland said the committee appointed to study the matter originally will review the degree of interest demonstrated this week and decide if it should propose to the board adding a second team.
"We'll go through the whole list of kids, see what ability level they have and decide what we want to do with it," he said. 'If the committee feels we need two teams, we'll take it to the board. Parents attending the Monday meeting expressed concern about the gap between the time youth travel teams are selected in late August and the high school team will be selected in November.

Rick Jones, assistant principal at North Farmington and a committee member, said the school district doesn't encourage students to break commitments; however, every school with a hockey team and every player on those teams faces the same dilemma. There's no way around it, and it's the same for everyone. The team is expected to carry 20 players — two goalies and it's skaters. Players won't necessarily be chosen equally from the three schools.

Holland said head coach Glenn Breuhan and Buller will be asked to pick the top 20 players.

coaches will have the responsibility to pick the team," he said. The cost to participate for each player will \$750.
