

Umbro-Michigan captures women's indoor team title

The Czech Republic had Dominik Hasek in goal, while Umbro-Michigan had a "dominator" of its own in the March 7-8 North American Indoor Soccer Championships.

Umbro-Michigan, formerly the Farmington Furies, took the women's over-30 crown with a 3-1 win over defending champion Indianapolis Limited at Total Soccer in France.

Coached by WJR-Radio newscaster Gene Fogel, Umbro-Michigan captured four straight games to win the coveted title.

Goalkeeper Julie Campbell of Plymouth was sharp throughout the tournament, particularly in the finals.

"The women were awesome," Fogel said. "They played magnificent soccer throughout the tournament and it was definitely a team effort."

In the championship game, Julie had to make several great saves in the last three minutes as Indianapolis fought to retain its title.

Former Livonia Churchill All-Stater and Michigan State University standout Jennifer Huogli-Wilkin, scored 10 of Umbro-Michigan's 14 tournament goals to earn MVP honors.

She scored twice in the finals to help erase a 1-0 halftime deficit.

At Total Soccer in Southfield March 7, Umbro-Michigan opened tournament play with a 4-2 victory over the Farmington Angels followed by a 6-2 win over Indianapolis as Huogli-

Wilkin, who now resides in Brighton, scored four times.

On Sunday, Umbro-Michigan downed the Toronto Rangers, 9-0.

shots I've ever seen from a female soccer player," Neff said.

Senior Marina Vasquez returns to a starting role in the midfield, and the fourth halfback will be freshman Lorianne DeDomenico.

Senior Emily Curtin and freshman Beth Leffingwell, one of two sisters who moved from Ohio, provide needed depth in the mid-

"We've got a lot of strength in the midfield, and we hope that will provide attack and defense," Neff said. "With those players, we hope for a very dynamic and aggressive midfield."

Junior forward Jamie Jakacki was another of the team's leading scorers. Junior Brynn Maki, sophomore Kara Twenty and freshman Beth Kolacki will rotate into the game at the other forward position.

"Depending on the circumstance and the opponent, we're

going to take advantage of their skills, and any of those (latter) three could start," Neff said.

"Their assignment up front is to score goals, to be playmakers for the midfielders and to create havoc for the opposing defense."

The Farmington defense is no less experienced with four returning starters in junior sweeper Claire Lockhart, senior stopper Dana Babinski, junior fullback Olivia Nellums and senior defender Sarah Turk.

Also helping on defense will be

junior Michelle Martin, sophomore Laura Leffingwell and senior Deanna Vacca, who returns to soccer after a year away.

"We're working at getting them to play together in a system that will make them pretty good," Neff said. "Of course, we haven't played our first game, but we're hopeful we're going to be good on defense."

"We definitely have some strength there. The test will be against the real good teams in our league."

The Falcons also are split at goalkeeper with senior Kate Adams, a two-year starter who was all-state in cross country and also plays ice hockey. Sopho-

more backup Dana Wantin got a lot of playing time last year when Adams was hurt.

"Kate is extremely athletic," Neff said. "She has excellent hand-eye and eye-foot coordination. Her athleticism really helps her. The goal position is in good hands with both of them."

The Falcons were scheduled to start the season Saturday in a game with West Bloomfield and will play host to Farmington Harrison at 6:30 p.m. Monday.

"There's a lot of team spirit," Neff said. "We moved up a little bit last year; we felt like there were some accomplishments. If we can move forward again, we'll feel like it was a pretty good season."

An Ordinance to amend the City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, of the City of Farmington Hills, to amend Section 34.33 to reclassify property as hereinafter mentioned:

The City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, hereby ordains:

Section 1. That the City Code of the City of Farmington Hills, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, is hereby amended in part to amend Section 34.33 to reclassify certain property in the City as follows: to show OS-2, Planned Office Service District classification where RA-2, Single-Family Residential District classification is now shown in the area described as follows:

Sidewalk #23-11-351-002

A part of the West 1/2 of Section 11, T1N, R9E, City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, commonly known as Lot #28, Oakland Hills Orchards.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect twenty-one days after their enactment.

Section 4. This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the Council Members of the City of Farmington Hills, at a duly called called meeting held on the 23rd day of March, 1998, and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.
