First cars on Sunday leave Junction at 7:00 a. m.

A SERIES OF OPEN MEETINGS

TO BE HELD IN THE METHODIST CHURCH

Undenominational and Free and Open to Everybody. Talks and Discussions

A series of mass meetings of the citizens of Farmington and the surrounding community, are to be held in the M. E. church auditorium, beginning Thursday, Oct. 5, at 8 p. m. These meetings are to be purely undenominational and are convened only that every intelligent citizen, who has the interest and well being of his home community at heart, may have an opportunity of discussing with others community problems.

The first meeting, Thursday evening, Oct. 5, has for its topic for discussion "The Challenge of the Community." There is to be special music, and after the address a chance for open discussion. Think about this subject and come prepared to discuss it. "What sort of a church does Farmington need most."

The second meeting in this series will be held on Wednesday evening, Oct. 11, at 8 o'clock in the M. E. church. The address will be given by Rev. Evans of the Presbyterian church, Redford, on the topic, "The Challenge of the Church of the Community." Rev. Evans is a gifted speaker and everybody should hear him. There is absolutely no charge for these addresses. There will not be so much as a collection taken. These gentlemen are offering their time and efforts for the sake of the community.

Following these two meetings there will be others with topics of great interest for discussion. Some of these topics will be: "The challenge of the child," "The demand of the professional men on the church today," "The challenge of the business man to the church," "The farmer and the church," "The young man problem," etc.

Change of Time on the D. U. R.
Under the new schedules of the Detroit United lines going into effect October 10, all cars on the Orchard Lake division will operate fifteen minutes later than at present.

The first car will leave the Junction for Northville and Detroit on their old time.

In addition to other schedule alterations there will be seven fast passenger express cars on the trolley line to Toledo, leaving Detroit at 7:00 a. m. and every two hours to 7:00 p. m., stopping at Wyandotte, Sibley and the other smaller towns, but making no country stops. These cars will make the run to Toledo in two hours and fifteen minutes and are in addition to the limited car service.

EUROPEAN NAVAL RIVALRY.

According to a recent statement by M. Delacoste in the French chamber, the French fleet will equal that of Germany in 1920, both in Dreadnaughts (52) and in armored cruisers, but with an advantage on the German side in the matter of ordnance. The Paris Journal des Debats, on the other hand, places the figures for 1920 at 28 Dreadnaughts for France and 28 for Germany, and 7 armored cruisers for France and 7 for Germany, for the French navy, as against 15 for the German. The Temps calculates that by that time the German navy will surpass that of the republic by one third.

Three Members Get Expenses Paid to the World's Series Base Ball Games

The Farmington base ball team took second prize in district No. 8 in the Evening News base ball contest and will have all expenses paid for three members to one game of the world's series. The Pontiac team won first place. Farmington did remarkably well for a town of its size as they were right with the leaders at all times.

Electric Light Wires Nearly Here

Linemen are stringing the heavy copper wires for the electric light service and will reach Farmington in a few days. The line of poles and all equipment used by the company show that no expense is being spared to make it capable of efficient service.

Strike Natural Gas at Redford

While drilling a well on the Coleman lot on Grand River avenue at Redford, a few days ago, the workmen struck a pocket of natural gas and lighted the flow at the top of the pipe. There was not much force to it and the quantity was probably not very extensive.

Just Struck Water in Quicksand

The well drillers are down 110 feet as the paper goes to press Thursday noon but the pipe is in quicksand and has been since it reached 90 feet below the surface. They are going on down in the hope of finding a bed of gravel. There is plenty of water in the quicksand, but it would be useless to try to use it.

The factory at Hangchow employs 8,600 hands and produces fifty or sixty tons daily.
