Danielle Ventimiglia (St. Clair Shores South Lako) and Shana Pratt (Gaylord) signed national letters of intent Wednesday. The transfers are Katic Knake (Grand Valley) and Paula Wasa (Michigan Tech).

Ventimiglia averaged 19.5 points, eight rabounds, four steals and four assists for South Lako. The 5-foot-10 guard was an all-league and All-Metro-East player.

"Daniello will be an excellent addition to our team and will give us immediate dividends," Covert said.

Pratt was a Class B all-stater who averaged 28.9 points and nine assists as a junior. A knee injury forced the 5-9 guard to sit out the renior season.


