

POLICE CALLS

The following are police and fire incidents that occurred in Farmington and Farmington Hills during the past week.

MARIJUANA POSSESSION

In Farmington Hills:
Police arrested a Northville man, 18, after finding 2 grams of marijuana in the 1993 Ford Escort he was driving on M5 near I-275 April 7.

THEFT

In Farmington Hills:
A woman's briefcase containing three gold rings was stolen April 6 from Doctors of Internal Medicine office on 13 Mile.

A Farmington Hills male, 14, told police a man asked to see his Nike Air Jordans and ran off with them at the Costick Center April 9. The man jumped into a vehicle, which was later stopped by police. The shoes weren't found.

BREAK INS

In Farmington Hills:
A cellular phone and woman's wrist watch were stolen after the locks were popped on a 1997 Ford Expedition parked inside a garage at a Beantree residence April 4. A bicycle was also taken from the garage.

The front passenger window was smashed and the glove box opened on a 1992 Honda Accord parked at Morcy High on 11 Mile April 8, causing more than \$100 damage. Nothing appeared to be stolen, though.

DRUNKEN DRIVING

In Farmington Hills:
Police arrested a Redford man, 70, for drunken driving on northbound Middlebelt and 11 Mile at 10:40 p.m. April 7. Police stopped the 1988 Ford Crown Victoria after it was traveling 25 miles an hour and weaving. The driver said he'd been drinking whiskey all night at a bar a block away from his house and was lost on his way home. He had a blood alcohol level of .22 percent, which is more than twice the legal limit.

VANDALISM

In Farmington Hills:
A door window was shattered on a 1997 Chevrolet Tahoe parked on Wilton April 9, causing \$400 damage.

The tires were slashed and an unknown substance put on a 1993 Chevrolet Cavalier parked on Forest Hill between April 9-10, causing more than \$1,000 damage. The vehicle's owner has also received three threatening phone calls recently. Two other vehicles nearby were not damaged.

BOGUS BILL

In Farmington Hills:
A motorist told police he received a counterfeit \$5 bill from a gas station April 8. Ink on the bill was blurred and it didn't have the feel of a normal \$5 bill, police reports said.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

In Farmington Hills:
A woman said her husband punched out the window of the vehicle she and their 2-year-old son were in April 8. The two got into an argument when he went to driver's side and punched the window, shattering it. It wasn't known if he was aware the window was rolled up or he was trying to punch his wife in the face, police reports said.

ASSAULT

In Farmington Hills:
A 22-year-old man was treated for a cut on his face after being hit with the large end of a pool cue at Champions Pub and Club on Haggerty April 8. The assailant hit the victim in the face and three times in the back before fleeing. The victim knew the attacker and said the assault may stem from a fight the pair had in the seventh grade.

BURGLARY

In Farmington Hills:
Police arrested four teens, ages 17-19, in connection with a burglary at a Livingston Circle home shortly after midnight April 9. A neighbor phoned police after he noticed two males inside the home switching lights off and on. Police questioned occupants in a Ford Explorer parked on Hunt Club and found two wrist watches in the center console. The driver didn't have a license with him. With the help of K-9 dogs from Southfield police, officers found more jewelry and 1.5 grams of marijuana.

Jewelry was stolen after a sliding door was knocked off its hinges at a Farmington Road residence April 8.
