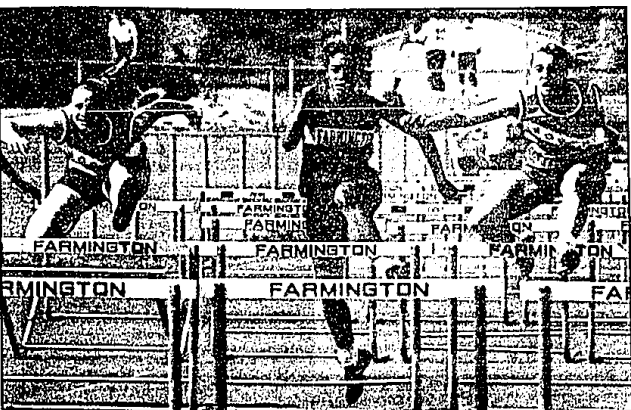

Mahogany Fletcher had four firsts in the long jump, the 100 dash and two relays.

Karlyn Knutson (400), Emily Mayberry (100 hurdles) and Lisa Rosemary (300 hurdles) had one individual win apiece and another as a member of a relay team.

The Hawks had additional winners in Kerstin Andzolewski (discus) and Becky Zak (high jump).

"For us, it's the beginning of a tough stretch with five meets in 10 days," Harrison coach Mark Babcock said. "We'll take a deep breath and build on each meet."

## Franklin upsets Harrison

Livonia Franklin coach Dale Lee was waiting for this kind of performance from his team, and the Patriots are relishing a rare boys victory over Farmington Harrison as a result.

"We exploded," Lee said after Franklin demolished Harrison in a Western Division dual meet Thursday in the Western Lakes

Activities Association, 81-66.

"We have a good team, but today we stepped it up," Lee said. "It was kind of a surprise."

It was a total team effort.

"Harrison isn't a bad team. It's been a long time since we've beaten them."

The Patriots, who had a school-record performance from senior Dan Colip in the high jump, is 3-2 overall and 2-0 in the division. The Hawks are 1-2 overall and 0-2.

Colip broke Guy Burke's 17-year-old record with a leap of 6-3. Burke had held the record since 1971 when he cleared 6-2.

Another impressive performance was turned in by Ryan Shiplett, who cleared 13-0 in the pole vault.

Franklin also had a trio of individual double winners — Matt Lawson in the shot put and discus, Pat Hayes in the 110 and

300 hurdles and Josh Burt in the 1,600 and 3,200 runs.

"Harrison has some gaping holes in the distance events, and our distance runners behind Burt stepped up," Lee said.

Harrison individual winners included Kevin Woods, long jump; Jerrard Johnson, 100 dash; Keith Battle, 200; and Wes Morland, 400.

Johnson, Woods, Battle and Andre Davis won the 400 and 800 relays, and the foursome of Morland, Battle, Brad Person and Chris Koziera captured the 1,600 relay.

"In the events we were down they were strong, so we matched up very well," Harrison coach John Reed said. "They had some very good performances. In the events we're good, we ran well, in the events we're not strong, Franklin hurt us."
