"Breaking the Silence," a program on the difficulties of Holocaust survivors, will take place Monday, May 4, at Congregation Shomrey Zedek-B'nai Israel Center, 4200 Walnut Lake in West Bloomfield.

The program will feature a panel of speakers and the presentation of a musical composition based on a survivor's testimony.

Participants include Sidney Bolosky, professor of history at the University of Michigan-Dearborn, Henry Krystal, professor of psychiatry at Michigan State University and a faculty member of the Michigan Psychoanalytic Institute, Henry Greenspan, lecturer in clinical psychology at U-M, and Gabriel Bolosky of the Cleveland Institute of Music.

Topics include "Listening to the Silences," "What Cannot Be Forgotten or Remembered," and "Remnants," a 30-minute play. Admission is free; the public is invited.

## She sets the stage for festival of arts

Visitors to the Farmington Community Arts Council's Festival of the Arts this week may notice the nice touches surrounding the works of art on display.

For instance, the three garden clubs in the community (Farmington, North Farmington and Hill and Dale) have each presented an attractive table setting displayed among the paintings and sculptures.

For the Starry Night preview party on Saturday night, guests walked into a gymnasium transformed by flowers, a waterfall and colorful canopies suspended from the ceiling.

Enter Pam Schultes, in charge of staging for the third year in a row.

"It's a year-long process, really. The crew here at the (Costick) activities center is very helpful," said Schultes, a representative from the North Farmington Garden Club.

A Farmington Hills resident who grew up in Farmington, Schultes longed to return to her roots after a 17-year hiatus in Florida for her husband's military career.

She originally worked in creating window displays for Hudson's and Crowley's department stores before becoming an independent floral designer.

"That career worked well with my husband's military duty," she said.

Schultes is now a seamstress who works out of her home. She is also the mother of two teens: Theresa, 19, and a student at Oakland Community College, and Fritz, 17, a North Farmington High senior.

"This year (the arts festival) had many corporate sponsors," she said. "That made it more exciting. We were able to spread our wings a bit."

## Adat Shalom hosts stars Jon Voight, Theodore Bikel for Israel celebration

Two stars of Broadway and film will team up on Sunday, May 17 in a musical tribute to Israel's half-century birthday.

The concert, featuring Theodore Bikel and Jon Voight, is sponsored by Adat Shalom Synagogue and will offer members and the community a glimpse into Israel's sights and sounds since May 14, 1948.

Bikel was 13 when he and his parents left Austria for Palestine in 1937. A graduate of London's Royal Academy of Dramatic Art, he had by 1946 also developed a interest in guitar and folk music. He made his mark as an actor in a London production of "A Streetcar Named Desire," starring Vivien Leigh.

His career has been illuminated by stage and screen portrayals for more than 50 years. Bikel created the role of Baron von Trapp in "The Sound of Music," toured in "Zorba the Greek" and played Tevye in "Fiddler on the Roof" more than 1,000 times before taking the production on a 30th-anniversary tour two years ago. He says he is not a specialist "but a general practitioner in the world of the arts."

Jon Voight earned his first Academy Award nomination in 1969. Since then, he has earned numerous other awards for his memorable performances in the film "Midnight Cowboy," "Catch 22," "Deliverance" and a score of other stage and screen productions.

Originally cast as Jane Fonda's gung-ho soldier-husband in "Coming Home," he persuaded Fonda and director Hal Ashby to allow him to portray the role of paraplegic Luke Martin, which earned him an Academy Award.

Voight recently starred in "The Rainmaker." In addition to a TV career, he is known for his humanitarian efforts on behalf of homeless people, Vietnam veterans, Native Americans and children affected by the radiation problems of the Chernobyl nuclear power plant in Russia.

Admission to the concert is free and available on a first come, first serve basis.
