## His doctor can still see him in hospice



Q. My hus-band is very sick and we are consider-ing a hospice program. His-personal doc-tor has taken care of him for over 20 years and we would like to have him continue seeing my hus-

And we would rike to have MAHER him continue sceing my husbard have been and if we go to a hospice, do we have to give up our doctor for one of theirs?

A. If your personal physician will continue to take care of your husband, it should be perfectly fine with your hospice program. The doctor who services the hospice program would serve as an advisor to your own doctor. If your husband is staying at home and your personal physician does not make house calls, the hospice physician will. All patients have rights. That includes those in a hospice program, whether it is in a facility or at home. Patients also have the right to stop the hospice program or to change to a different one if they are not pleased with the program they have selected.

Q. My neighbor gets some kind of tax credit for hereating bills. How do I find out if can get some help too?

A. I think you are talking about the Home Heating Credit program that is run by the Michigan Department of Treasury. You can apply for this tax credit if you are low income, receiving unemployment benefits. Eligible persons must meet the standard credit income guidelines that are based on household income, exemptions and heating costs.

If you wish to make a Home Heating Credit claim, for the 1997 tax year, you must file your
