Malek pitches CC to victory over RU

Detroit Catholic Central assistant baseball coach Ed Hamacher pulled out a portable camera and took a team picture at home plate after a 9-0 win Monday over visiting Redford Union.
Good thinking.
Hamacher knew enough to stay behind the camera and to snap it while the Shamrocks were in a good mood.
No one had more reason to smile than junior Bob Malek, who made his first pitching start of the year one to remember.
Malek, normally a center fielder and relief pitcher, tossed a no-hitter through four innings and didn't let an RU batter reach base, striking out four.
The teams used the traditional four-ball, three-at-bat count instead of the 3-2 format used by the Catholic League. But it didn't matter the way Malek hit the strike zone. He walked none, facing the minimum 12 batters.
Two of RU's hardest hits went

right back to pitcher's mound and Malek made the assists.
"Bob does it all," said CC coach John Salter, who is tempted to use Malek on the mound more often. "He throws strikes, gets ahead of hitters and fields his position well."
The non-league win raised CC's record to 10-3 overall. The Panthers are 11-3.
It's the first time this year that something Malek did in the field overshadowed what he did at the plate.
A leadoff batter, he has a .722 batting average and an on-base percentage of .868 after going 3-for-4 with one run scored and an RBI.
Salter said he's never seen anything like it, and he's coached Chris Sabo, the former CC star who played for the Uni-

versity of Michigan and several years in the major leagues.
"I just try to stay focused," said the left-handed hitting Malek. "The ball looks pretty big out there for me. My teammates keep me grounded."
The Shamrocks collected 12 hits against three RU pitchers. They scored one run in the first and five in the second against junior starter Jeff Rigley, who allowed six hits and three walks in two innings.
CC junior Casey Rogowski, who reached base four times, had an RBI double in the first to score Dave Lusky, who had walked.
Rigley got the first two batters out to start the second, but John Hill's triple and a walk to the ninth hitter, Mario D'Horia, put runners on first and third.
Malek, Lusky and Rogowski followed with RBI singles, and Matt Firlik had an RBI double to raise the lead to 6-0.
Firlik finished 3-for-4 with two RBIs; Lusky was 2-for-2 with two runs scored and two RBIs, and Rogowski was 2-for-2 with two walks, an RBI and a run scored. Chris Woodruff added an RBI

single.
The game turned around with two outs in the second and we walk the No. 9 hitter," RU coach Rick Berryman said. "They hit well, some good line drives. Once we got down six, we started swinging impatiently."
"Some days you just get beat. They were the better team today and I give them credit."
"But we made two double plays, hit the cut-off man and throw a runner out, and the catcher (Rigley) blocks the ball in the dirt and throws a runner out at second. You've got to stress the positive things you do even in a loss."
Rigley and sophomore third baseman Mike Maccek picked up the only Redford Union hits. Rigley's cmo against Adam Harris and Maccek's off Mike Haller.
Harris pitched the fifth and sixth innings and Haller the seventh.
The Panthers got runners on second and third with two outs in the fifth following walks to Joel Halliday and Kris Montambo, but Lusky's fine play up the middle ended the threat.
