

Farmington rolls over Garden City

Farmington coach Bob Neff says defense played a large part in his team's 7-0 victory Friday over Garden City in girls soccer.

"Our defense has been so outstanding," Neff said. "Now they're also getting involved in our offense."

Jamie Jakacki and Emilie Villemonte accounted for all of the Farmington scoring. Jakacki had four goals and Villemonte three.

The assists were registered by Angela DeDomenico, Clare Lockhart, Michelle Martin and Villemonte.

"Lockhart is a sweeper and Martin is a defender," Neff said, "and they were very involved in our offense."

Dana Wantin recorded her first shutout of the season, although she has shared in several others.

Farmington is 7-4-1 overall and maintains the No. 2 rating in Division II among state soccer teams in the coach's poll. Grand Rapids Forest Hills Central is rated No. 1.

"Our team is playing pretty well again," Neff said, "and we're looking forward to Walled Lake Western on Monday."

On Wednesday, Andrea Galindo's goal from Stacy Suprenant midway through the second half enabled Livonia Churchill to defeat Farmington in a WLAA crossover game, 1-0.

The Chargers, rated No. 7 in Division I, outshot the Falcons, 21-13. Churchill goalkeeper Jennifer Gibson made five saves en route to the shutout.

"We had to bring back Colleen Solisson," Shivraman said. "She and Abbey Shepherd controlled the midfield in the second half. The defense kept us in there today."

Marie Lentz, who "controlled everything in back and made a lot of solid plays," according to Shivraman, also contributed to the defensive effort along with Katie Weiss, Argenta and Erin Cohn.

Kelly Fuller was in goal for the Marlins and made nine saves.
