

Cobras runner-up in 1st tournament

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that the regular biennial election for the Oakland Community College district shall be held on Monday, June 8, 1998, in conjunction with the regular elections of component school districts. At this election, three trustees shall be elected to the Board of Trustees of Oakland Community College for regular 8-year terms beginning July 1, 1998 and ending June 30, 2004.

State law prohibits election inspectors from receiving the vote of a person who is not registered as an elector.

The last day for receiving registrations for the election will be Monday, May 11, 1998. Persons residing in the Oakland Community College district registering after 5:00 p.m. on Monday, May 11, 1998 will not be eligible to vote at the election. Persons wishing to register to vote must register with the clerk of the city, township or village in which they reside, or at a Secretary of State drivers license bureau or other location as provided by law. Persons planning to register must determine when the city, township or village offices or Secretary of State drivers license bureau offices will be open for registration.

Please take further notice that only registered electors residing in the Oakland Community College area of any component school district will be eligible to vote at the regular biennial election of Oakland Community College.
